HEALTH PROBLEM IS UP BEFORE DOCTORS

With Renewed Vigor at Opening of Their National Convention at Atlantic City.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) ATLANTIC CITY, June 23—Wrestling with the world-wide problem of public health is to be undertaken with renewed vigor by the American Medical Association. This broader aspect of public health conservation was dominant over the case of the individual at the opening here of the sixty-fifth annual meeting of the association. Today's session was that of the House of Delegates, the legislative body of the association, which now represents a membership of 41,029, as the secretary reported. The treasurer's report shows a balance of over \$140,000. Among the expenditures for the year were \$18,465 for education of the public, and over \$10,000 "for propaganda against frauds and fakes."

The report of the Council on Health and Public Instruction outlined a comprehensive program for extending the study of the public health. The plans are for a thorough investigation of public health conditions in the United States, with the gathering of more reliable data; the education of the public "by every possible means;" and "the crystallizing of public sentiment in securing necessary public health laws, regulations and ordinances which will render possible a conservation of human life commensurate with our advancing knowledge."

HEAVY RAINS

In the State of Kansas Wash Out Railroad Tracks and Stop Business.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) KANSAS CITY, June 23—Heavy rains have washed out railroad tracks in eastern Kansas and brought to a standstill business on several lines. Near St. Joseph, Chicago, Burlington and Quincy trains were being derailed because of bridge at Webster, Mo., went out. No trains were running between Atchison and Topeka on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe, a three inch precipitation in the intervening district having swept away large stretches of track.

The Missouri Pacific was temporarily tied up between Atchison and Kansas City. Twenty-five hundred feet of track on the Topeka St. Joseph branch of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe was washed away last night. At Valley Falls, 800 feet of track was swept away while similar damage reports came from other points.

Cole issued the following appeal Monday afternoon: "To the citizens of Clarksburg and Harrison county: "In view of the plans now being made for a county wide celebration here July 4 and the further fact that this is one of our great national holidays, I wish to appeal to you as loyal and patriotic citizens of Clarksburg and Harrison county to observe this day by closing up your respective places of business and participating with us in the celebration and picnic to take place in this city. Let the observance of this independence day mark the beginning of a great get-together movement on the part of the citizens of Clarksburg and Harrison county, for an aggressive development of the rich natural resources with which we are so abundantly blessed."

DEFEATED OF COURSE

By Kanawha Democrats is Resolution Calling for Cleaner Politics and Reforms.

CHARLESTON, June 23—A resolution calling for a higher standard of politics as "adopted by the people of the country and evidenced by the repudiation at the polls of the old methods used at the Republican National Convention at Chicago," and providing for a fair primary law, a corrupt practices act, a county salaries law and the initiative, referendum and recall was defeated at the convention of Kanawha County Democrats here. The convention instructed for A. B. Littlepage for the Congressional nomination. The Republicans of Kanawha county in convention here affirmed the nomination of Congressman S. B. Avis as their Congressional candidate.

RAILROADS WIN

Fight for Title to \$70,000,000 Worth of Oil Lands before Supreme Court.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, June 23—Transcontinental railroads have won their fight for title to some seven hundred million dollars worth of oil lands when the supreme court held void the clause in the patents making the lands revert to the government if found to contain mineral.

HEARINGS

Of Suspected Highway Robbers Are Set for Tuesday Afternoon.

The hearings of Matthew Colish, Samuel Bordish and John Portridge, arrested Saturday by policemen as suspected highway robbers, have been set for 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon in Magistrate T. G. Nicewarner's court, in which charges were preferred against them by Harry L. Brooks, police chief. The three prisoners have been transferred from the city lock-up to the county jail awaiting the hearings.

Two charges have been preferred against the men by the police chief. One is conspiracy to rob and the other is violation of the anti-weapon statute. An Italian who told the police that one of the men held him up and robbed him of \$5 watch Saturday afternoon in Glen Elk also said that the man and his two companions had revolvers at the time. When searched at police headquarters, however, no weapons were found on the men.

NO QUARREL

Has President with Any Persons or Corporations as to Their Opinions.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, June 23—Discussing the so-called "psychological" business depression with callers President Wilson declared he had no quarrel with any persons or corporations who desired to express either to him or to Congress their own opinions on business conditions and anti-trust legislation but he contended that systematic circulation of form letters and telegrams protesting against new legislation was "certainly open to criticism." The president said that all he wanted was a square deal and that everything should be open and above board. Telegrams and letters forwarded to government officials constituted an additional campaign, he believed.

CORNERSTONE IS LAID

WESTON, June 23—Fully 2,000 people witnessed the laying of the cornerstone of the new Catholic church and school building here Sunday. The Rev. R. F. Flanagan, of Moundville, acting for Bishop Donahue, of Wheeling; Father O. H. Moye, vicar general of the diocese, and Father Kennedy, of West Union, participated in the ceremonies. The new church and school building will cost over \$100,000.

FATAL PTOMAIN POISONING

FAIRMONT, June 23—Lillian Snodgrass, 8 years old, daughter of Mrs. George Snodgrass, of Monongah, died Sunday from ptomaine poisoning caused from eating green apples. Her father, George Snodgrass, and grandfather, Fleming Snodgrass, were killed in the big mine disaster at Monongah several years ago.
