

## MOSS'S SPEECH

Is to Be Used by National Republican Congressional Committee.

(SPECIAL TO THE TELEGRAM)  
WASHINGTON, June 24.—Congressman Hunter H. Moss was today requested by Congressman Frank

Woods, chairman of the Republican National Congressional Committee, to be allowed to distribute throughout the country the speech delivered by Judge Moss in the House of Representatives June 4 last. The committee by this request evidently considers the Moss speech one that is of sufficient consequence, as reviewing the record of the party in power and setting forth the principles and record of the Republican party, to exercise a material influence on the vot-

ers wherever it is sent. Chairman Woods's request was granted, with the result that thousands of copies of the Moss speech will be sent broadcast throughout the country into those congressional districts where it is considered it is most likely to do the most good for Republican party success.
