MOTOR-AMBULANCES

Are Equipped to Assist in the Immediate Removal of the Wounded Soldiers.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The American volunteer motor-ambulance corps, organized by Richard Norton of Boston, Mass., has equipped ten motor-ambulances to assist in the immediate removal of wounded from the battlefields in Europe. In many cases the wounded have been without medical aid from five to seven days, says Mr. Norton, thereby promoting the deadly effects of tetanus, gangrene, and other dangerous complications.

The first unit of this American corps, with Harvard, Yale, and Princeton graduates largely represented among the volunteers, has already left for the front, accompanied by Mr. Norton, under the charge of Col. A. J. Barry, of the British Red Cross society, with a staff of two.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Federal quarantine to check the spread of foot and mouth disease was extended Friday over the state of Iowa and Massachusetts by Secretary Houston of the Department of Agriculture. The disease has now appeared among cattle in ten states.

The buggy was completely demolished. Miss Jackson's escape from death was miraculous.
