Other attractive numbers in the rich score are, "Jim," "Love's Own Kiss," "I'm Through With Roaming Rovers," "Chi Chi," "Not Now, But Later," "Come Hither Eyes," "I Know Your Husband Very Well," and "Dixiana Rise."
