

TAKING PICTURES OF LINCOLN ROAD FROM AUTOMOBILE

Trip is Being Made in Packard Automobiles with Noted Chauffeur Driving Car.

At exactly 10:30 o'clock Saturday morning, May 15, two glittering motor cars, carrying complete moving picture equipment, left the New York city hall for an historic film producing tour of the Lincoln highway. Mayor Mitchell and staff were gathered in the towering archway in official recognition of this notable project.

A few minutes before, the mayor, seated in the executive office, received from an instrument on his desk, the following wire transmitted by a private key in the Detroit office of Henry E. Fox, president of the Lincoln Highway Association:

"I ask your honor to start on its way the official Lincoln Highway motion picture cars and staff. The establishment of the Lincoln Highway, the picturing of its possibilities by moving pictures, will open America's great scenic playgrounds, including the national parks, to American tourists, will create throughout the wonderful West, hotels and highways superior to those of Switzerland and make that western third of the United States a bee-hive of tourists 'Seeing America First'."

The tour is under the personal direction of A. R. Pardington, vice president of the Highway association. The Packard Governor's Special, heads the motorcade, has two Lincoln Way brassards emblazoned on its door panels. It was specially finished for this trip and is driven by Thomas Stalker, an expert who was formerly at the head of the Packard chauffeurs' school. This car will carry the thirteen governors during the passage of their respective states as traversed by the Lincoln Way.
