Officer Takes Farley from the County Jail to Philipp for Trial.

Who Are to Deliver the Same to the Factional Leaders in Mexico.

NOT TO TOLERATE LONGER

Conditions as They Now Exist is the Attitude of the President.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—President Wilson's warning to Mexico that the United States cannot permit present conditions to continue, went forward by telegraph today to American agents who will deliver it to the factional leaders and was at the same time made public at the White House.

For more than two years revolutionary conditions have existed in Mexico. The purpose of the revolution was to rid Mexico of men who ignored the constitution of the republic and used their power in contempt of the right of its people and with these purposes the people of the United States instinctively and generously sympathized.

Mexico is apparently no nearer a solution of her tragical troubles than she was when the revolution was first kindled; and she has been swept by civil war as if by fire.

It is time therefore that the government of the United States should frankly state the policy, which these extraordinary circumstances, it becomes its duty to adopt.
