Baseball Team Will Meet Edmond Denham's Norwood Park Team Here.



## Mexican Convention is In Wildest Disorder

Galleries and Speaker's Tribune Are Rushed by Hordes of Hungry Persons.

MEXICO CITY, June 8.—For the last three days the sessions of the so-called national convention in the chamber of deputies building have been the scenes of the wildest disorder.

Not only the galleries but at times the floor and the speaker's tribune have been rushed by hordes of hungry men, women and children. The shouts of "We want corn" drowned all others and even the show of bayonets and the firing of the soldiers over the heads of the mob have not checked their vain and pitiless search for food. The Red Cross has been kept busy carrying off women and children and in some cases old men crushed or overcome in these manifestations.

Ten thousand gathered outside the chamber Monday and nearly 300 were carried out on stretchers. It is estimated that unless relief comes from the outside more than 13,000,000 people will be in danger of starvation.

## TO LOSE PLACES

Are Several Persons as They Are Legislated Out of Their Positions.

CHARLESTON, June 8.—Less than one month remains for certain employees of the Bureau of Archives and History of the state government. At the present time there are about fifteen persons employed in this department, but after June 30, there will be appropriations for only five persons, and the other ten will be out of employment unless taken care of by their political friends in some other department.

The last legislature made appropriations for only five persons, specifying them and their salaries. They are librarian, historian, curator, stenographer and janitor. The present librarian is Miss Mabel E. Jones; historian, Henry Greene; curator, Arthur Thompson; and stenographer, Maud Lewis. Other than these persons there will be no funds to pay so whether the same, originally set for that a number will be out of position. G. A. Bolden, who was assistant historian, but who is now at San Francisco at the Panama-Pacific exposition, where he is attached to the West Virginia building.

### COAL TAX

Bill Passed by the Legislature is Adjourned by Governor of Pennsylvania.

HARRISBURG, Pa., June 8.—The bill placing a two and a half per cent ad valorem tax on anthracite coal was Monday announced as approved by Governor Brumbaugh. The new law takes the place of the act passed by the 1913 legislature, the constitutionality of which is now in the state supreme court. The act is expected to raise about \$4,500,000 in the next two years, half of which is to the state for road improvement and the other half is to be returned to the counties in which the coal is produced.

### THAW TRIAL

Is Postponed until June 16 to Await the Court of Appeals Decision.

NEW YORK, June 8.—Harry K. Thaw's trial by jury to determine whether he is sane, originally set for Monday, was postponed until June 16, by Supreme Justice Hendrick to wait the decision of the court of appeals on the state's appeal from Justice Hendrick's decision granting Thaw such a trial.
