Tomorrow the great masterpiece "The Three of Us," featuring the popular little actress, Mabel Taliferro, will be the feature offering. It is in five thrilling act full of heart interest.

Joe Clark and Gene Gauntier are working on a two reel Universal story, by Ben Cohn entitled "The Mate of the Primeval." They are at the same time completing several scenes in "The Ulster Lass" which were delayed on account of certain elaborate sets not having been built in time.

The feature picture today at the Robinson Grand is a Fox production entitled "The Celebrated Scandal," with Betty Nansen, the royal actress, in the leading role. Miss Nansen is the star of the Royal theater, Copenhagen. She has been decorated by kings and emperors. She was the friend and inspiration of Henrik Ibsen and the creator of his hetic heroines. Of her the master dramatist said: "She does not act; she is." Director James Durkin deserves full credit for a remarkable film play. He made most of the thrilling situations with which the production abounds, and the care with which the details are worked out denotes the hand of a master craftsman. As an added attraction Charles Chaplin is also on the bill. Tomorrow dainty, magnetic Marguerite Clark, the star of "The Goose Girl," makes her second appearance here in a bewitching characterization of "Widdowow."

A production to be made late this month in Atlantic City is "The Girl," by George Scarborough. The production had been planned by Charles Frohman and David Belasco, and all the former manager's plans and all the latter's are being carried out. In the cast are W. H. Thompson, Lowell Sherman, Arthur Lewis and John Milner. The production is under Mr. Belasco's personal supervision.

"The Idyll of the Hills" is the headliner at the Star theater today. It features Miss Pauline Bush and is a Tennessee romance in two reels.
