PERSUASIVE

Argument with Revolver Causes Escaping Prisoner to Stop.

"Halt!"
"Bang! bang! bang!"
And William Flannigan, alleged bootlegger, halted, fearing that a bullet from a revolver in the hands of J. Walter Bee, deputy state commissioner of prohibition, might come uncomfortably near.
Flannigan started to run away from the officer in Elk creek bottom near Pinell's livery barn Friday forenoon shortly after the officer had arrested him at the Baltimore and Ohio railroad station, but he had not gone very far when Mr. Bee's revolver made a very persuasive argument for him to stop. Mr. Bee shot several bullets into the ground in order to frighten the escaping man but there is no telling what might have happened had Flannigan not heeded the impressive warning.

The officer then took Flannigan to the county jail, there to await the action of the criminal court. Flannigan had been indicted by the grand jury on a charge of bootlegging and various officers had been on the lookout for him.

SUIT CASE

Containing Liquor is Seized and Owner Jailed for a Trial.

Arrested at the Baltimore and Ohio railroad station, as he was returning from a Maryland city with a suit case containing intoxicants, Veto Jorum was landed in the county jail Friday forenoon by one of the special prohibition officers hired by the prosecuting attorney to run down Yost law violators.

Jorum's imprisonment resulted from his failure to have proper labels on the suit case he carried, according to the special officer. The suit cases, containing a one-gallon jug of whiskey, a quart bottle of brandy, a pint bottle of whiskey and two quart bottles of some other kind of liquor, were seized as evidence and locked up.

DEGREE

Is Conferred upon Governor Hatfield by the Trustees of Bethany College.

BETHANY, June 11.—Dr. H. D. Hatfield, M. D., L. L. D., are the titles now attached to the name of the governor of West Virginia.

When the chief executive arrived here to attend the commencement exercises of Bethany college and to deliver an address to the graduating class he was a plain M. D. At the final meeting of the board of trustees of the college, the honorable title of doctor of laws had been conferred upon him.

CHANGE

Is Made by Faculty in the Entrance Requirements.

MORGANTOWN, June 11.—The faculty of West Virginia University has made a radical change in the entrance requirements for the college of arts and sciences, having dropped Latin and Greek from the list of subjects required for the bachelor of arts degree and having abolished the degree of bachelor of science. Hereafter the college of arts and sciences will grant the degree of bachelor of arts upon students who may not have taken a single unit of either Latin or Greek.

BIDS FOR BRIDGE.

GRAFTON, June 11.—Bids have been taken by Taylor county for the construction of a reinforced concrete bridge at Grafton, approximately 600 feet long, estimated to cost \$50,000.

TRAINS STOP

Now at the West Clarksburg Station as Result of Board of Trade's Effort.

Upon request of the local wholesale interests for the accommodation of traveling men, particularly, as well as the traveling public generally, the board of trade asked the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company through its superintendent, J. M. Scott, of Grafton, to arrange for the stopping of all passenger trains on the Richwood and Weston branch at West Clarksburg until the completion of the new fourth street bridge and the re-establishment of street car service between the city and Clarksburg. This request was very promptly complied with and West Clarksburg has been made a regular stop for trains Nos. 5 and 2, and a flag stop for trains Nos. 7 and 8.

PNEUMONIA

Causes Death of Arthur Dale Fleming after Long Illness of Other Diseases.

Arthur Dale Fleming, aged 19 years, died Friday morning at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George A. Fleming, on Millford street, Stealey Addition, after a long illness the last few days of which he had pneumonia.

The deceased boy is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Fleming, a brother Rinell Fleming, and two sisters. The sisters are Mrs. Wanda Mitchell, of Mt. Clare and Miss Geneva at home.

The funeral services will be held at 11:30 o'clock Sunday morning at the Methodist Episcopal church at Enterprise and the Rev. W. M. Slaughter, will have charge of the services and the burial will be in the Odd Fellows cemetery. The funeral party will leave the interurban station on the 10:30 o'clock car Sunday morning.

PYTHIANS

At Shinnston Will Observe Annual Memorial Day Sunday.

SHINNSTON, June 11.—Sunday will be Pythian Memorial Day and it will be observed by Rathbone lodge, No. 52, Knights of Pythias, of this city. The members are requested to meet at the hall at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon and march to the cemetery where the Rev. B. B. Stout, of Bridgeport, will deliver an address. The general public is invited to assemble at the cemetery and witness the services and hear the address.

Charged with exceeding the speed limit on East Main street, the owner of an automobile bearing license No. 14 is today being sought by city police. Complaint was made by Officer Donahue who says the car passed over the East Main street bridge on the same street at a high rate of speed.

CRUISER IS SUNK.

INSBRUCK, (BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) by courier to the Swiss frontier and Geneva, and Paris, June 11.—Announcement has been made here by the Austrians that one of their submarines yesterday sank a British cruiser of the E-class type thirty miles off St. Gean Medua in the Adriatic.

TO ANNUL PARAGRAPHS.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The United States has instructed its diplomats abroad to ask for the annulment of those paragraphs of commercial treaties which conflict with the new seaman's law. As the seaman's law does not become effective until March 16, 1916, for foreign ships, there is much time for diplomatic exchanges.

TO SUE

Governor of State Are Traveling Men Who Were Arrested at Point Pleasant.

HUNTINGTON, June 11.—On the grounds that they have been humiliated and materially damaged, as the result of the action of Governor H. D. Hatfield, of West Virginia, in causing their arrest on Sunday March 15, and their subsequent imprisonment in the Mason county jail at Point Pleasant, for the alleged theft of a testament belonging to the executive, from a table on a Kanawha and Michigan diner, George Raush and William J. Abbott, Philadelphia traveling men, are preparing to bring suit for damages, in which Governor Hatfield will be named as defendant. Joseph B. McCoy, a Philadelphia attorney, has been in Spencer, W. Va., this week consulting with Pendleton Matthews and Bell, who with Lynn and Bryne, of Charleston, will represent the plaintiffs in the West Virginia courts.

The Midvale Steel Company employees of the plaintiffs are said to be backing them in their fight for vindication. Attorney Bell of the Spencer firm, stated today that there would be three suits.

Rauch and Abbott will enter suits charging false arrest and Raush will claim damages for assault and battery.

Bell said the suits would be brought in time for July rules in the circuit court of Kanawha county.

BASEBALL

Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock the Hazel-Atlas baseball team will meet the Norwood Park team on the park diamond. The teams are evenly matched and a fast contest is assured.

TEUTONS

south of Neuville failed. Fighting at close quarters in the trenches north of Eucure continues. Southeast of Hobuterne and at Beaumont attacks of the enemy were repulsed yesterday and during the night. Only in the district of Serre Marne the French made an inconsiderable advance.

The French attempted last night to take away from us the trenches we captured in Champagne on July 9. Their attacks in strong forces extended along a large front to the north of Mesnil and as far as the north of Beausjour farm. The attack broke down completely with very heavy losses to the French. Repeated attempts to make night attacks were stopped at the very start. In the East on the lower Dubysa, northeast of Elrgola, several Russian attacks were repulsed. The enemy lost 300 prisoners.

ITALIANS ARE ADVANCING THROUGH AUSTRIAN PASS

UDINE, Italy, via Paris, June 11.—Italian forces today are advancing through Predil pass on the junction of the Laibach railway at Udine, which lies about six miles on the Austrian side of the Italian border. Trails of Italian wounded soldiers are arriving at Udine.

RACE OFFICIALS.

Frank R. Moore will be the official starter of all races and contests at Clarksburg's big Fourth of July celebration, which will be held on the new fair grounds Monday, July 5. W. E. Hursey, Dr. M. Steele and Camden Sommers will be the judges and James M. Shields clerk.

COUNCIL MEETS.

The city council held a meeting Thursday night to discuss matters pertaining to use of the Fourth street bridge by the traction company. A councilmanic committee appointed to confer with traction officials made a partial report and the committee was continued. The traction company has not yet consented to pay for the use of the bridge.

SMACKS SUNK.

MIASTLUS, Holland, via London, June 11.—The British ding smacks, Wether and Laurestina, were attacked and sunk by Zeppelins in the North sea. The crews took to their boats and were picked up by a Dutch smack and brought here.

JURY DISAGREES.

FAIRMONT, June 11.—After being out two days and one night, the jury in the case of Edwin Kelley, charged with the murder of Marcus Ray Morgan, was discharged last night, as it could not agree. Eight stood for acquittal and four for manslaughter. The killing of Morgan created a sensation last October. Kelley will be tried again.

MADISON GUILTY.

John Doe alias "Bob" alias Hugh Madison, who was on trial in the criminal court charged with violating the prohibition law, was found guilty Friday.

DR. TROTTER

Is Being Considered for Presidency of Wesleyan College at Buckhannon.

CHARLESTON, June 11.—One of the most important events at the commencement season of Wesleyan College, Buckhannon, this year will be the meeting of the board of trustees, June 14 and 15, for the purpose of electing a new president of the institution, according to the announcement of one of the trustees here today. The commencement exercises for the graduating class will begin Friday, June 11.

There are a number of candidates for the place, but it is understood that the old student body as represented on the board is very much in favor of Dr. Frank B. Trotter, now acting president of West Virginia University, provided he can be persuaded to accept the position. Dr. Trotter is not a candidate, and it is not known whether or not he would accept if elected.

The state board of regents is expected to name the president of the state university in the near future, and it is known that a great number of persons interested in the university are in favor of placing Dr. Trotter in permanent charge of that institution.

The board will meet Monday, July 5 and legally select and notify teachers. Several changes have been decided upon. The new board will be comprised of Emory H. Bates president and Charles D. Elliott and Meade Taylor.
