**Geographer Describes  
Government of Lublin**

Where the Onward Rush of Teu-  
tonic Invasion Was First Ar-  
rested by Czar's Forces.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—The  
Russian government of Lublin,  
where the onward rush of Teu-  
tonic invasion was first arrested by the  
Muscovites, is described in a state-  
ment issued today by the National  
Geographic Society.

"The region where the Austro-Ger-  
man forces were brought to a halt  
in their campaign in southern Poland  
by the first determined Russian  
stand is of the nature of an elevated  
plateau, scooped here and there  
deeply by rivers, and heavily wooded  
with forests of oak, beech and pine.  
In belts, the land is severely torn,  
a complex of hill and ravine. Over  
much of its area, it is thinly populat-  
ed, and presents stretches of wild,  
unkept, trackless forest and thicket.  
There is plenty of natural cover for  
armies operating there.

"Lublin is the southeasternmost gov-  
ernment of Russian Poland. It is  
contained, east and west, between the  
rivers, Bug, and Vistula. The river,  
Bug, divides Lublin from the Rus-  
sian government of Volhynia, while  
the river, Vistula, divides it from  
the Russian Poland government of  
Radom. Galicia bounds it upon the  
south, and the government of Siedlce  
upon the north. Thus, the war re-  
ports that announced the intended  
withdrawal of the Russians to the  
line of the Bug, were looking for-  
ward to the abandonment of almost  
all of Russian Poland. The Bug river  
flows in a wide arc to the northeast  
and north of Warsaw, joining the  
Vistula river near the powerful Rus-  
sian fortress, Novo Georgievsk, about  
forty miles north-northwest of the  
Polish metropolis.

**Strategic Railway.**  
"The government has an area of  
6,500 square miles, and a population  
estimated at about 1,400,000. It is  
a rolling plain, interrupted with knots  
and belts of hills. In the northern  
part, where the Lublin-Kholm rail-  
way, of strategic importance, crosses  
the government road on its way be-  
tween Warsaw and Kiev, is the den-  
est-forest growth. Also, in the north-  
ern neighborhood is the city of Lub-  
lin, the third manufacturing town of  
Russian Poland. The Vistula, the  
Bug, the Wieprz, San, Tanev rivers  
drain the district. A treacherous re-  
gion of lakes and marshes and black  
quicksands occurs in the east, reach-  
ing into Galicia. A marshy lowland  
also extends between the Vistula and  
the Wieprz.

"Heavy, black earth, of rich fer-  
tility, is found in parts of the gov-  
ernment, and this is mostly under  
careful cultivation. Rye, oats, wheat,  
barley and potatoes are the principal  
crops. A good deal of the Lublin  
grain harvest is exported. Flax, hemp  
and beet root are cultivated on the  
larger estates, and stock raising is  
carried on. The sugar beets are  
worked for their product in mills  
within the government; spirits, flour,  
leather, and lumber are other of its

manufactured products. There are  
some horse farms in the district,  
whose animals have a European rep-  
utation. The character of the gov-  
ernment is

**Distinctly Agricultural.**  
There are few cities and very little  
railway mileage, especially are the  
railways lacking in the south and  
central parts.

"At one time, German immigra-  
tion threatened to over-run this re-  
gion, the Teutonic settlers being at-  
tracted by the rich, promising soils,  
and the great consumer's markets  
easily reached from Lublin. In 1877  
however, this immigration was effec-  
tually stopped. There were, probably,  
more than 28,000 Germans in the  
district at the beginning of the war.  
It was the influx of German settlers  
that largely brought about the adop-  
tion of modern methods in this part  
of Russian Poland for the cultivation  
of the soil. The roads running north  
are of indifferent quality, and, tak-  
en together with the almost entire  
lack of railway facilities, the maneu-  
vering of armies through this territory  
must be surrounded with considera-  
ble effort and difficulty."

**BRAZIL HAS  
FINE EXHIBIT  
AT EXPOSITION**

Is the Latest Foreign Exhibi-  
tion to Show Products at  
San Diego Fair.

SAN DIEGO, July 16.—A Brazilian  
exhibit of comprehensive character  
and peculiar interest has just been  
added to the foreign representation  
in the Commerce and Industries  
building at the San Diego exposition  
by Dr. Eugenio Dahne, formerly  
commissioner general representing  
the minister of agriculture, industry,  
and commerce of Brazil in the United  
States and Canada.

While the Brazilian congress failed  
to make appropriation for national  
exhibits at the Panama exposition,  
contributions by each of the several  
states made possible so excellent a  
representation as that installed by  
Dr. Dahne.

This is so arranged that from one  
end to the other it represents the in-  
dustries, environment and mode of  
living of the inhabitants of Brazil  
from the northern to the southern  
boundaries. At the northern end  
Dr. Dahne has reproduced a native  
rubber gatherer's hut set in the  
midst of a bit of Amazon jungle and  
will name it "Roosevelt cabin" as a  
tribute to the former president's ex-  
pedition in Brazil. Pelts of the na-  
tive wild animals peculiar to this  
section adorn the cabin, together  
with grassmats and other handwork  
of the natives.

As the chief source of automobile  
tires and other rubber goods, sixty  
varieties of rubber as prepared by the  
natives for marketing are displayed.  
Coconut palms are shown in growth  
and the peculiar characteristics of  
the developments of a variety of  
marked nuts depicted. The fine  
hard cabinet woods of Brazil are  
shown in eighteen kinds.

Coffee, of which the state of San  
Paulo produces annually 1,500,000-  
000 pounds or two-thirds of the world  
supply, is roasted, ground, prepared  
and served to visitors that they may  
know the flavor of pure, unblended  
coffee, properly prepared. Cream is  
labeled.

Coming to the southern Brazil,  
Yerba Mate, or the native tea, un-  
cultivated but growing wild in abun-  
dant and extensively used by the  
natives of this section of Brazil, Ur-  
uguay, Argentine and Chile, and the  
peculiar manner in which it is served  
is shown. Here also is found the  
cocoa bean, the Manjok root and the  
method of its preparation into flour,  
tapioca and resemblances of maca-  
roni. Here also is the Guarana vine  
nut which the natives grind into  
flour, form into hard sticks the shape  
and size of a policeman's "billy" and  
are not without upon expeditions be-  
yond the assurance of food, for pow-  
der, scraped from these sticks with a  
dried fish tongue and dissolved in  
water, forms a drink of remarkable

**BIG COAL DEAL**

Western Men Purchase Large  
Tract in Gilmer and Brax-  
ton Counties.

WESTON, July 15.—One of the largest  
coal deals ever made in central  
West Virginia was recently consum-  
mated here when J. M. Shackelford, of  
Glenville, sold to Lloyd Beeghley and  
Andrew Edmiston all of his coal hold-  
ings in Gilmer and Braxton counties,  
consisting of about 2,000 acres of as  
good coal land as there is in the state.  
Nine hundred acres of this coal land  
is in Gilmer county, along the Little  
Kanawha river, hundreds of acres  
fronting on the river. About 1,000  
acres is along the Coal and Coke rail-  
road. It is all Pittsburg coal, and  
the vein is eight and one-half feet in  
thickness, and the analysis shows it

to be the best grade of West Virginia's  
famous product.

The location of these tracts makes  
them doubly valuable, because of the  
facilities for haulage. A greater part  
of it could now be mined and shipped  
out over the Coal & Coke, or sent  
down the Little Kanawha. Then too,  
if a railroad ever goes into Glenville,  
it must necessarily go through the Gil-  
mer tract, and this would enhance in  
value the coal along the Kanawha.

The price has not been given out,  
but it is supposed to have been around  
\$200,000, which would be in the neigh-  
borhood of \$100 per acre. Mr. Beegh-  
ley and Mr. Edmiston are fortunate  
indeed, to have secured such vast  
holdings, and in a few years the prop-  
erty should be worth easily twice the  
present price.


