WASHINGTON, July 28.—For weeks German regiments have been working their way from Cracow and Piotrkow, north and northwest, toward Warsaw through the government of Radom.

"Nearly a million people are reported in the government, and its industry has been developing rapidly through recent years. Radom is rich in certain minerals, in iron ore and clay. Coal and zinc also occur.


