**D. AND E. FOOTBALL TEAM TO PLAY HERE**

Game Will Be Played before Big W. and J. Wesleyan Game.

Elkins, Bethany College, November 25, at Elkins.

ELKINS, August 2.—H. P. Mulliner, the star tackle of West Virginia's eleven in 1914, has accepted the position at Davis and Elkins College as coach and faculty manager of athletics, and through his untiring efforts has about completed arrangements for a training camp along the beautiful Tygart's Valley river, south of this city. "Mully," as he is known throughout the state, needs no introduction to the followers of the gridiron. The prospects at his former school, he reports as being very good. In fact he expects to put out the best team in the history of the institution. All of last year's team will report September 1 to go to the training camp along with several new men, whose name Mulliner does not think it wise to mention at the present time.

On November 13, at Union park, Clarksburg, he will line up his warriors against Coach Chamber's team of Marshall College, as a preliminary to the big game between Washington and Jefferson and West Virginia Wesleyan College. Marshall won from Davis and Elkins last year by a lone touchdown, and he expects to turn the tables on the normalites from Huntington.

Richard Hamill was elected captain of the 1916 season, and looking back over his previous record, one can see a banner year for the little footed end. According to the dope at hand Captain Hamill will be used in the backfield, either at quarter or half, as Coach Mulliner will inaugurate the West Virginia system, and therefore use big ends. He says that the ends will be well taken care of, as several big men have signified their intention of trying for the end job.

"Mully" has an exceptionally fine schedule to work on. At Wheeling, on October 2 he will see his first team start against Lindsley Institute, and on the following Monday Bethany College will be met.
