LONG HERE Popular and Efficient State Treasurer Looks after Candidacy for State Auditor. The Hon. E. L. Long, of Charleston, state treasurer, is a prominent visitor in the city today. He came here from Marlinton and will go from this place to Buckhannon. Next week he will attend the Wheeling state fair. Treasurer Long is serving his second term. He is efficient and popular. The great majority he received at the last state election attested his popularity then and it has grown even greater since. It was a pronounced endorsement of his splendid record as a state official. Mr. Long is a candidate for the Republican nomination for state auditor. His experience as treasurer makes him exceptionally well qualified for the office of auditor. His visit to the interior of the state is in the interest of his candidacy. So far he has no opponent for the nomination. His candidacy is receiving such widespread support and approval that it is more than possible he will have no opposition for nomination and the latter means his triumphant election as everyone knows.

ONE BOY HELD For Action of Criminal Court Grand Jury for Breaking in and Robbing Store. Charles Weigel was held for the next criminal grand jury, Elsworth Jones was dismissed and Magistrate Jackson V. Carter reserved his decision as to Clyde Golden when the three boys were tried Friday morning in his court for feloniously breaking into and robbing L. T. Silcott's general store at Bridgeport, several weeks ago. Weigel and Golden were sent back to jail. Weigel in default of a bond and Golden until the Magistrate decides his case. The boys were arrested by J. M. Combs, chief of police at Bridgeport.

NEW CHURCH Fund of \$15,000 is Authorized by the State Conference to be Assessed. The latest news in regard to a new Methodist Protestant church here is that the West Virginia conference has given sanction to the laying of an assessment of \$15,000 on this district for the erection of such a building. The Clarksburg church is a mission church and as such receives the support of the entire district and is not entirely dependent upon the Clarksburg congregation. There is already a small church here and a valuable piece of ground for a site is owned.

HOTEL LODGERS Are Jailed under a Charge of Selling Whiskey in Their Room. Charged with selling whiskey in a room of a West Pike street hotel, several men giving the names of Henry and Albert Durham are prisoners in the county jail awaiting trials before a magistrate. They were arrested late Thursday afternoon by J. Walster Bee and J. H. Tenney, deputy state commissioners of prohibition. The officers were searching the room the men occupied in the hotel when the latter walked in, one with three pints of whiskey in his pockets and the other with five pints. This liquor was seized and stored in the basement of the county jail to be used as evidence in the case.

PERRY FURIOUS Upon Being Jailed by Police Officers and He Pays Just \$15 Extra. So furious was John Perry because he had been locked up in the city jail Thursday night that he began attempting to destroy everything in the cell, immediately after he had been placed in jail. Officers heard the noise and stopped his destructive work. He was charged with being drunk in the streets, but an additional charge of disorderly conduct was added after his outburst in the cell. In police court Friday morning Perry contributed \$21.60 into the city treasury. Had he remained quiet upon being locked up, his fine would have been only \$6.60. It pays to keep quiet sometime.

PROBING CRIME. GRAFTON, Sept. 3.—Officials of Preston county are hard at work attempting to discover clues which may lead to the arrest of a person or persons who were responsible for the blowing up of the motor car of Charles Teets, of Cranesville, Preston county, and the killing of Charles Strawser and the serious injury of his brother Wednesday night.

FALLS IN SCALDING WATER. WHEELING, Sept. 3.—While playing at the home of Mrs. Mary Healey, Thelma Lowe, three years old, was scalded but not seriously when she fell into a bucket of hot water.

WANTS \$10,000 DAMAGES. CHARLESTON, Sept. 3.—A suit has been entered against the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad Company by Mrs. Mary Fenimore, wife of John Fenimore, of St. Albans, who was killed in the wreck at Pinnacle tunnel on the Coal river branch of the defendant railroad company, for \$10,000.

ODD FELLOWS' MEETING. HUNTINGTON, Sept. 3.—The tri-state association of Odd Fellows will hold its annual convention in Huntington, September 22. Several hundred members of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows lodge will be here at that time.

OFFICES MOVED. W. Y. Stotler took place Thursday afternoon at the residence in East park, with a large number of relatives and friends in attendance. SHINNSTON CHILD DEAD. Cora Ollis, aged 4 years, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Toney Ollis, of Shinnston, died at 4 o'clock Friday morning in a local hospital, following an illness of paralysis. Funeral services were held Friday afternoon and the burial was in the Holy Cross cemetery.
