HER LATEST NOVEL IS ALSO HER BEST



Amelle Rives (Princess Troubetzkoy). "Shadows of Flames" is the title of Amelle Rives' latest novel, which has just been published. Utensils—Bowl, cutting board, knife, cup, teaspoon.
How to make—Line salad bowl with lettuce leaves; mix potatoes, carrots, onions, half the parsley, salt, paprika and place in bowl. Wash

CORRUPTION

Is Prevalent in China and One Instance is Quite Interesting.

PEKING, Sept. 8.—An interesting story of corruption existing in one of the provincial governments of China is told in an official communication to the central government from the acting governor of Szechwan. The governor states that the magistrate of Chintang-hsien, with the object of reporting falsely that the government treasury had been looted by the rebels, opened his city gates to welcome the "Tufel" (outlaws). The report continues: "The 'Tufel' were then allowed to come into the city to loot the shops of the various merchants and traders, causing a great panic. Thus the magistrate was enabled to submit a false statement of the loss of the official funds. It has also been found that the magistrate was known to be an avaricious and cruel man, and had murdered a person named Liang Kuang-ha. When confronted by the parties concerned he confessed to all his crimes."
