NEW CLOTHES FOR THE HOUSE

At just this time of year when the house has to be done over for the fall the up-to-date woman finds that the styles for draping and decorating her place of abode now change as rapidly as those for her own person. Each season requires a greater effort to keep up with them. It is not enough merely to have a set of draperies for the winter and another for the summer. Mid-season style, ring in a bewildering confusion of color schemes and new ideas. Their novelty so strongly appeals to some women as to make their last winter's home draperies seem as impossible as their last year's clothes, though the quality and material of both be above criticism.

Orders heavier. Paper hanging and painting have been combined with upholstery and draperies with increasing frequency within the last five years. The orders for all four in a single season are now many times as heavy as they were a few years ago. The smart shops show their customers series of beautifully colored pictures depicting in-


teriors in which walls, draperies and woodwork all blend into one harmonious, symphony of color and design. The woman who had merely intended to order fresh paper for her bedroom or parlor contemplates these pictures and is lost. She sees herself moving gracefully about in surroundings the like of which had never before been presented to her. Matched draperies and wallpaper present an allurements even greater than an imported gown. She gives the order which may make heavier onslaught upon her husband's bank account.

American manufacturers have made marvelous progress in the development of tapestries and other draperies within the single year which has elapsed since the war lessened the importation of foreign goods. A number of expert foreign weavers have been brought into this country from France and England. Their skill combined with American machinery and an increasingly large number of new motifs, have resulted in rendering the drapery production of this fall the most elaborate yet made in America. An exhibition of these fabrics now being made in the National Museum at Washington, under the auspices of the American Federation of Art, prove that these late products of the American loom will stand close comparison with the costliest hangings from the old European castles.

A number of textile designers were permitted to make studies of their patterns. Excellent reproductions of these Morgan tapestries are being placed upon the fall markets at prices which bring their work rich coloring within reach of the moderate income.

Genuine French tapestries as well as reproductions are now being manufactured in this country by a colony of weavers who emigrated to Will-

bridge, a small village in New York a few years. They are working after precisely the same methods employed by their ancestors in Aubusson and other old French cities noted for their fine weaving. Every man in the colony is a weaver by inheritance, having followed the trade of his ancestors for centuries. The Williamsbridge tapestries are identical in quality and texture with those made in France a century ago. Many of the weavers are still working upon designs inherited from their ancestors.

Another tapestry weaving center in this country which is producing goods of rare quality in connection with the Vanderbilt estate at Blitmore, North Carolina. This work had its beginning with the boys' club and other welfare work inaugurated by George Vanderbilt in 1904 for the young people in the adjacent mountains. At first their products were crude, and only fit for sale at bazaars or to tourists. But better work and finer materials have been combined recently so that the textile products of the Blitmore settlement are now commanding recognition for their artistic value.

The progress made in American tapestry manufacture is being demonstrated at the San Francisco Exposition, where the exhibition of textile weaving is the finest yet assembled in the world. The largest tapestry ever made in this country was completed for this exhibition. It is a reproduction of the large painting, "Westward the Star of Empire Takes its Way," executed for the national capitol a half-century ago. The tapestry was made from photographs and water-color drawings of this great historic picture and every detail is reproduced with excellent effect. It has been pronounced fully equal in quality and coloring to the coronation tapestries of England or the most celebrated of Europe depicting historic events.

American tapestry weavers are branching out into original designs. Instead of slavishly copying the old pastoral scenes of Watteau and Boucher they are developing motifs of their own having national association. Half a century ago a few American china decorators took such subjects as Niagara Falls, Harvard College, Mount Vernon and other beautiful and historic spots for the production on china. They did not win favor at that time, although the original models command princely sums now and are being extensively reproduced. But the textile manufacturers are adopting these same views and countless others as motifs for household decorations. They are also being used not only in heavy tapestry, but in cretonnes and calicoes designed for draperies. Instead of having our walls decorated with old French chateaux and English towers it will soon be possible to obtain historic American landscapes. In addition to these views of the Grand Canyon, Yellowstone Park, the Catskills and other bits of natural beauty, have been adopted as wallpaper motifs. It has been possible for several years past to paper a room with panels of well-known American scenes. Now these same views are being reproduced in draperies.

Full Pocket Unnecessary. Tapestries are not suitable for all kinds of rooms and many women see no appeal in them. The fresh bright colored cretonnes and chintzes are better suited to the average home, and their price may be high or low to suit the purse of the buyer. It no longer requires a full pocket to have wallpaper and drapery in the same pattern. Some of the daintiest designs shown are in wallpaper at 25 cents a roll, with cretonnes and chintze in comparative prices. The number of new materials being offered for house clothing is a conspicuous feature of the drapery and upholstery trade this season. Printed mohair in bright colors is conspicuous and differs distinctly from the cotton fabrics it is to replace. Goat's hair damask is another novelty shown in natural gray, although it is promised in a variety of shades a little later. A new material woven in Italian stripes is manufactured from the silk waste in Italian factories. Despite the interference of the war it has been brought into this country in quite large quantities within the last six months.

The color schemes vary even more than the fabrics. A few months ago many women were enthusiastic over the magpie effect of a black and white color scheme for both bedrooms and living rooms. Some decorators introduced a vivid orange shade with the black and white, which was pronounced chic and modish at first, but has already become tiresome to most of those who possess it. The dull French grays are still preserving their popularity, both for wallpaper, drapery fabrics, and furniture, but their cold somberness is being lightened by the introduction of the favored color. A room which was cold and gray in the spring can be given a cheerful warmth for the winter by adding draperies of rose-colored casement cloth, a soft woolen material which has lately been introduced from England, where it has been popular in country house furnishings for at least a quarter of a century.

Club Colors Adopted. The decorations of many homes are strongly influenced by the colorings used in the clubs of the community, especially the country clubs to which both men and women belong. Frequently the club rooms will be furnished in a single color or to represent a distinct historical period. A new club in Ohio had its hall and ladies' reception room furnished in blended shades of yellow. Within less than three months the parlors in that town gleamed with draperies, rugs and upholstery in the same golden hues.

The growing use of fabrics throughout the house is a new development of furnishing. A surprisingly large number of bedrooms are now being furnished throughout with a single patterned floral fabric which is not only used for upholstery and drapery, but is pasted flat upon the woodwork of the furniture. The same motif appears in the panels which break the monotony of the plain tinted walls.

Many New Effects. A few years ago the writers on home decoration in household magazines advised impecunious housewives to paste cushions over old wood when new furniture was out of the question. Now the millionaire home is using fabric-covered furniture probably because some decorator saw

its beauty and utility in some farmhouse furnishings and glorified it to suit the elegance of the larger home. Many new and bizarre effects in household decorations are wrought by Madame Nouveau Riche, who slavishly attempts to copy effects without understanding the period represented or the meaning of the motifs employed. But these mistakes are being reduced by the broad education in this direction which is being given in this educational work. A progressive firm in a middle west city had a series of stereopticon view showing interiors of many kinds. Furnishings, including draperies and tapestries were included. The home departments of the women's clubs have been invited to attend lectures by competent decorators who use the stereopticon views as illustrations. It is believed that this procedure will be productive of more harmonious furnishings and lessen the lavish purchase of inappropriate draperies and furniture.
