OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

Lemonade.

Much more juice may be extracted from oranges and lemons if the fruit is first covered with cold water and allowed to come to a boil before the fruit is cut. Add the juice of three lemons to a quart of rich boiled syrup made of plain sugar and water. Pare the yellow peel from the lemons, and unless you mean to use immediately leave it out. It gives a bitter taste to the sugar if left long in it. Place in self-sealing fruit jars and place on ice. When you want lemonade, a spoonful of this mixture can be added to a glass of water with little trouble. Orangeade is made in the same way, substituting oranges for lemons.

Marmalade Tomato.

Pare and slice eight pounds ripe tomatoes, add four pounds granulated sugar, six large lemons, sliced and then halved; one pound seeded raisins; put in pot, mix and cook from one to one and a half hours, or until quite thick. It is excellent served with cold meat or duck.
