NEW BLOOD IS INFUSED INTO CUMBERLAND FAIR

Which is to Be Held Last Three Days of the Month and One Day More.

The new blood that has been infused into the affairs of the Cumberland Fair and Agricultural Association is telling in a way that promises the largest exhibition and race meeting in years. Recently a committee of prominent young men of this city, assumed the management with the result that preparations are well in hand. The meeting is on September 28, 29 and 30 and October 1 and 2.

The races will all be filled. Many horses have already been entered. One prominent racing man will bring his whole stable—two carloads here. Representatives of the association have been visiting the various fairs securing entries and these visits will be kept up until just before the meet. Here opens. The selling of pools is legal at the Cumberland races and this makes the speed feature the more attractive. The local track is in the Lake Erie circuit.

Great interest is being shown this year in the live stock exhibit, which will be large, the first time in a long period. Registered horses, cattle, sheep and swine will be shown in large numbers and the poultry exhibition, which will be revived, will be fine. There will be a large exhibit also of ponies of various breeds.

Unusual efforts are being directed toward a large and classy fruit exhibit. Cumberland is in the center of a large belt and it is proposed to establish a fruit show to become a marked feature of the fair each year. Much space will also be given to the horticultural and truck farming exhibits.

In the main exhibition hall a large display of fancywork, household art and the products of domestic science will be had. Hoaglan Brothers hippodrome will provide ten free attractions. This attraction carries twenty horses and includes Roman standing and chariot races, running races and exhibitions of trick horses and trick riding. Sensational Smithson, in a whirl down a long plane on a bicycle jumping wide chasms and the Florentine troupe of wire walkers have also been engaged. The midway attractions will be numerous, many concessions having been sold and will include plantation show, oriental dancers, athletic show, animal show, ferris wheel, gigantic carousel and other attractions.

The fair will run over to the fifth day—Saturday—for which these special features will be provided: Ten-mile auto race, five-mile auto race, marathon race, starting at the Six Mile House on the national pike and ending at the fairgrounds and a county race for horses, driven by owners, for which a \$500 purse is provided.
