Charged against New Fair Grounds Negro and He is under Bond.

Charged with feloniously cutting H. A. Whittington, colored, of New Fair Grounds with a knife, Miles Banks, also colored, of the same place, is under bond of \$500 for his appearance before Magistrate R. Edward Kidd at a trial to be held at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon.

Banks was arrested late Wednesday afternoon by Constable C. Q. Stout on a warrant sworn out by Whittington. He gave the required bond and was released from custody.



Is B. and O. Railroad Conductor When Struck by An Engine.

FAIRMONT, Sept. 23.—George Pyles, of Hardman, Taylor county, a few miles east of Grafton, was so badly injured yesterday at noon that he died at Fairmont Hospital No. 2 last night at 7:30 o'clock. He was employed by the Warfield Sandstone Company at Hardman, and while at work was in some manner crushed through the left hip and groin by an engine. He was brought here on train No. 55 and hurried to the hospital, but he had become so weak from the loss of blood that nothing could be done to save his life.

Mr. Pyles was a native of Pennsylvania and was 42 years of age. He is survived by his wife and six children.

CABLE SNAPS

And Perhaps Fatally Hurts a Railroad Man at Wreck near Catawba.

FAIRMONT, Sept. 23.—R. D. Shoeman, Baltimore and Ohio railroad conductor, of Conneltsville, Pa., was injured, probably fatally, yesterday afternoon when, while cleaning up a wreck on the main line near Catawba, a cable broke and struck him a violent blow on the head. He was knocked down, his head striking the iron rail with force enough to cause fatal injuries.

A small wreck on the main line near Catawba was the occasion for the calling out of the wrecking crew, of which Shoeman was the conductor.

The injured man was rushed with all possible speed to the Fairmont hospital, where he was given every possible attention, but where it was said that great care would be necessary to effect a recovery.

PERMANENT

Road through State to Be Planned at White Sulphur Springs.

CHARLESTON, Sept. 23.—Plans for constructing a permanent highway through West Virginia will be discussed at a meeting of the Trans-Allegheny Good Roads Association to be held at White Sulphur Springs, September 15.

WOMAN SHOT

By Fairmont Negro, It is Charged, and He Afterward Swallows Poison.

FAIRMONT, Sept. 23.—James Obie, a negro, is in a critical condition in the county jail after swallowing poisonous tablets, following an alleged attempt to kill Mrs. Mary Croats, a negro, with a revolver, as she sat upon the porch of her father's home on Coal Run. Two shots struck the woman, one entering the face below the right eye and coming out through the cheek, and the other piercing the right shoulder. Neither is serious.

After the shooting Obie walked into Justice M. R. Musgrove's office and gave himself up, declaring that he had killed the woman. He was held under bond and taken to jail, where he became ill from the tablets he had swallowed. Obie, who is married, is said to have been infatuated with Mrs. Croats. Neighbors think he is insane.

LONDON, Sept. 23.—The British steamer Gronigen, 988 tons gross, has been blown up. One member of the crew lost his life and several others were wounded. The survivors were landed today.

SWEDISH STEAMER SUNK.

LONDON, Sept. 23.—The Dutch steamer Koningen Emma of 9,000 tons, which struck a mine as it was on its way to Amsterdam from Batavia Java, capsized and sank in the Thames today. The 250 passengers had been previously taken off the steamer, which was being towed up the river when it sank.

SMALL LOSS IN CORPORATIONS

During a Month is Reported by the Secretary of State.

CHARLESTON, Sept. 23.—According to the report of Secretary of State Stuart E. Reed for the month of August the net loss in corporations chartered in West Virginia during that month was three. The disjunctions totalled forty-three, while thirty-two resident and eight non-resident corporations were granted charters during the month. Two corporations increased their authorized capital while seven decreased. In addition seven foreign corporations were authorized to do business in West Virginia.

Capital Out.
The biggest change in capitalization was that of the New River Company, operating various coal companies. Its capital stock was reduced from \$30,000,000 to \$15,000,000. The Western Elevator Company reduced from \$2,000,000 to \$100,000, and the Sure Oil and Gas Company from \$500,000 to \$100,000.

The larger non-resident corporations chartered during the month were: Capitol Coal Company of Pittsburg, \$25,000; Federal Zinc and Lead Company, chief works in Kentucky, \$200,000; the Ohio and Kentucky Mining Company, of Cincinnati, \$100,000.

Resident Charters.
Among the larger resident charters issued were Thermo-Pocahontas Coal Company, of Logan, \$100,000; New River Hardware Company, of Hinton, \$100,000; Brinker Croft Film Company, of Wellsburg, \$50,000; Cairo Window Glass Company of Cairo, \$50,000; Kaufeld Company, Star City, \$50,000; the J. H. Sluss Construction Company, of Huntington, \$50,000.

Foreign Concerns.
The foreign corporations authorized to do business in West Virginia during the month were: A. L. Anderson and Brothers, of Pennsylvania; Frick and Lindsay Company, of Pennsylvania; the Aeolian Company, of Connecticut; Penn Bridge Company, of Pennsylvania; Pyrene Manufacturing Company, of Delaware; South Chester Tube Company, of Pennsylvania; and the Hickory Ash Coal Company, a foreign corporation.
