In the Westview district, Nock
and Company are drilling their test
on the Ivory heirs' farm to the low-
er sands. A slight show of oil was
discovered in the 100-foot sand.
Steir and Company's test on the M.
Hartman farm and Williamson and
Company's test on the Swan
farm, both came in dry and have
been pulled out and abandoned. J.
Nock and Company are drilling a
second test on the J. Nock farm.
In the Smith's Ferry district, Res-
ear county, Hobbs Brothers and
Company's No. 5 on the Buchanan
farm is a very light pumper. The
same parties are due in the sand at
a test on the James Cunningham
farm. In the Kendall district, in
Hanover township, New Cumber-
land parties are drilling a test on
the J. A. McMullin farm and C.
May and Company have started to
drill a test on the George Smith
farm.

West Virginia.
Few and none better than light
pumpers are the offerings in the
West Virginia fields. On Sugar
creek, Union district, Pleasants
county, G. Higginbotham has
drilled a test on the Thomas Wag-
ner farm through the Cow Run sand
and has a duster.

In Union district, C. E. Morris
has completed No. 4 on the C. O.
Bailey farm and has a light pumper.
No. 5 on the same farm is
drilling. The Edmonds Oil Com-
pany has the rig completed for a
test on a part of the same farm.
The Engle Run Oil Company has
completed No. 8 on the A. Holden
farm and has a four-barrel pumper.
A. G. Higginbotham and Company
are drilling a test on the Thomas
Wagner farm, and the Neely Oil
Company has started to drill a test
on the T. A. Campbell farm. L. O.
White and Company have started to
drill a test on the T. A. Campbell
farm. H. C. White and Company
have moved in a drilling machine
and are starting another test on the
Riggs Brothers farm.

In the Eureka district, Pleasants
county, Sloan and Peddinghaus have
completed No. 17 on the Frank
Cochran estate and have completed
a second test on the N. Ford farm,
and have a light pumper. In Mc-
Kim district the Jefferson Oil Com-
pany has the rig completed for a
test on the C. L. Lucas farm. The
Ohio Oil Company is rigging up to
drill No. 6 on the M. E. Holdren
farm.

OIL AND GAS

Despite the fact that operators in
the town lot development at Evans
City, Butler county, Pa., have suf-
fered a heavy loss, there is still a
little work under way and starting
in the village. To the northeast of
the town, Douthett and Company
have completed a second test on the
Clayton farm and have a show for
a good producer in the 100-foot
sand. It will be drilled to the third
sand and if nothing is found in the
lower formation, will be put to
producing from the 100-foot.


Nearly one hundred wells have
been completed inside of the cor-
porate limits of the borough. Many
have stopped producing and have
been pulled out and others are so
small that it is only a matter of a
very short time before they will go
the same way. Of the hundreds of
investors in the town lot wells it is
estimated that not more than twenty
per cent will ever come back.
Those who will make a profit are

comparatively few. The B. F. White
farm, the Kritzberger seventeen
acres and Sutton heirs' farm will
pay back the money invested and
leave a margin of profit. The only
reason for these exceptions can be
attributed to the fact that they had
some acreage which afforded some
protection.

The production of the pool at a
liberal estimate is less than 300
barrels a day. There are those who
claim that it is considerable less. In
any event it leaves a small amount
to be distributed among the wells
not included on the White, Kritz-
berger and Sutton farms. The aver-
age size cannot be more than three
barrels.

Light Producers.

In the Duff City extension, Alle-
gheny county, S. L. McCreedy and
Company, have drilled a test on the
S. Logan farm through the 100-foot
and Snee sands and have a natural
producer from both formations, es-
timated to be good for five or six
barrels a day. It will be given a
shot. In the same part of the field,
Leidecker, Watterson and Company
are due in the sand at a test on the
P. Shenot farm. Considerable in-
advance of production, Berry
Brothers are drilling near the top
