Manager Murphy of Washington and Jefferson Withdraws Protest.

MORGANTOWN, Oct. 1.—Washington and Jefferson college will meet West Virginia University at football here on Saturday afternoon and Fullback Rodgers of the West Virginia team will participate in the game. After being notified that West Virginia was able to take care of her own eligibility rules, Manager Murphy of the Washington and Jefferson team, withdrew his protest as to Rodgers. It was thought at all times he would for he has a cash guarantee of \$1,300 for the game.

Indignation meetings on the part of the student body here over the protest crystallized Thursday evening in a meeting in which the members of the faculty, of the alumni and of

the student body participated. There it was voted that Rodgers would play the game or the contest would be cancelled.

Manager Murphy was notified of the official action of the local school and after a conference with his people phoned that the protest would be withdrawn.

The action of Washington and Jefferson seemed the most uncalled for in the history of local athletics, and showed so many strong signs of baby play that the greatest indignation was felt here.

The exact opposition to Rodgers' participation in the game was that he had played his four years' of football before coming to West Virginia. Washington and Jefferson claimed and she was upheld by the Pitt representative that he played a year as a prep and three years as a "varsity" man at Bethany. It was pointed out that Red Fleming was refused permission to play on Washington and Jefferson this season for the same reason.

While the Washington team on past performance looks like a ten to one winner in the game here on Saturday, West Virginia students believe their team will win. Preparations for the game are nearly complete and yesterday the final workout was given the squad by Coach Metzger.

The Washington team, accompanied by a large number of students, left this afternoon for Unontown, where the night will be spent. Saturday morning the team will come here, arriving about noon. The members of the squad are said to be in first class condition.
