Mrs. Earl Smith and sons, Charles and Paul, have returned from Belington after a week's visit with her parents.



## DR. ANGELL IS TO BE HONORED FOR SERVICE

Covering Long Period of Sixty  
Years with Erection of Mil-  
lion Dollar Structure.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Oct. 5.—The sixty years of public service rendered by Dr. James B. Angell, president emeritus of the University of Michigan, in education, diplomacy and journalism, are to be crowned by the building in his honor of a \$1,000,000 structure on the campus of the university. Into the local offices of the committee, charged with the campaign to raise the fund for the construction and endowment of the Michigan union club, house, there have been pouring lately from every state in the union, and from all parts of the world, suggestions and demands that the new building be dedicated to Dr. Angell, for forty-four years actual or titular head of the institution.

The officers of the union, which is an organization of students and alumni, received the suggestion cordially when first it was made and now that the communications from former students take on a note of insistence to the same effect, it is said, the realization of the building project will be accompanied by the materialization of the Angell memorial. The general tenor of the alumni suggestions is that alumni undergraduates, professors and citizens generally may express in the million dollar union home their regard for the man who has been their guide and mentor for nearly half a century.

It is peculiarly appropriate that the Michigan union home for students and alumni should be builded and maintained in the nature of a memorial to Dr. Angell, because it is to embody the newest idea in education propounded by the oldest educator," said Dean Henry M. Bates, of the law department, general chairman of the union campaign committee. "The union is devoted to a work which Dr. Angell always had at heart—the complete democratization of the students of a great university, and the socialization of all the forces of the university, faculty, undergraduate, alumni and citizen, to the end of higher and more effective service to the commonwealth and mankind."

Dr. Angell now is in his eighty-seventh year. He was born in
