FEDERAL BIRD CASE ARGUED

Before the United States Supreme Court and a Decision is Expected Soon.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—The United States supreme court has heard the argument of E. Marvin Underwood, assistant United States attorney general, in defense of the federal migratory bird law involved in a case appealed from the Arkansas courts on the killing of three coots out of the federal season.

Mr. Underwood quoted statistics from the department of agriculture showing that but ten per cent of the wild life in this country at the time the constitution was adopted remained and that the greatest slaughter has taken place in the last twenty-five years.

"This is a question of common law," said Mr. Underwood, "and under present conditions the only way to protect wild life is to vest the title to the property in the federal government. It is a question of very valuable property rights and the department of agriculture has shown that the game birds are worth hundreds of millions of dollars annually to the country."

"T. Gilbert Pearson, secretary of the National Association of Audubon Societies told me of the slaughter of robins in Georgia where as high as a hundred hunters would gather in a forest at night, climb trees with torches and easily knock down the robins which, blinded, rushed to them. One small hamlet received \$500 from these birds at five cents a dozen—birds which the department of agriculture tells us are worth \$5 a piece to farmers. The department says the insectivorous birds annually destroy billions of harmful insects and that the estimated damage from these insects to crops is about \$800,000,000 a year."

Mr. Pearson, who was one of those from whom Mr. Underwood received material assistance in the preparation of his brief, was present at the hearing. He said he was very much pleased with the manner in which the attorney had covered the ground. "If the law is declared unconstitutional," said Mr. Pearson, "the Association of Audubon Societies will push the establishment of additional federal reservations which already number sixty-nine. We are now at work on a book on the United States federal reservations, profusely illustrated, in which we show the large number of birds which take refuge on these reservations and their immense value to agriculture and the country at large."

GORE NAMED AS MEMBER OF DEFENSE

Society of Nation by Governor Who Appoints Several Other Members of the Same.

CHARLESTON, Oct. 20.—At the request of the national headquarters of the American Defense Society, Governor Hatfield has suggested a number of prominent citizens of this state as members of the American Defense Society of West Virginia.

This organization has a very definite program which it is carrying out throughout the country of urging adequate national defense and has undertaken to arouse public interest in this present day problem. OLD BIBLE

Contains the Family History of Kansas Man Back to 1703.

HOLTON, Kan., Oct. 20.—Captain Grimshaw is the possessor of a Bible printed at London by Robert Barker, printer to the king in 1811. The birth and death records of the Grimshaw family are given as far back as 1703, and the earlier records in the book date back to 1618. The book seems to be the first edition of the King James translation. It is printed in "Old English" and the peculiarity of the type and marked condition from age make it difficult to read. Captain Grimshaw ex-

pects to give the book to the state historical society.

Kansas Has Two Most Contrary Men in Existence

SMITH CENTER, Kan., Oct. 20.—This county boasts two of the most contrary men in Kansas. Last fall one man refused to pay the price asked by corn huskers and vowed he would let his crop rot before he would yield. About 2,000 bushels of grain still stand amid a dense crop of sunflowers.

The other contrary man is a neighbor of the first. He husked 1,000 bushel of his crop, stored it in an uncovered crib and said it would remain there till it brought him 75 cents a bushel. It is still there, but ruined by

the seasons' heavy rains. He refused 65 cents a bushel last spring.

PUP AND KITTEN Taken Away from a Farm in Wisconsin by a Large Eagle.

RHINELANDER, Wis., Oct. 20.—A nest of screaming little eagles feasted off a combination dinner of tender young dog and juicy kitten near the farm of August Schlichting. Mother eagle, or father eagle, Schlichting was unable to tell which fond parent it was, furnished the meal, and the farmer states that it was the largest bird he has ever seen of the bald headed type. A three months old puppy and a kitten of about the same age were taken away from the farmhouse when the eagle swooped down and grabbed them up.
