WALL STREET

As Seen From the Inside

The Rev. William Wilkinson, who has preached in Wall street more than ten years is spending three weeks in West Virginia. He has prepared this article for the Telegram.

Wall street is through the civilized world considered as the center of the money power in the republic of the United States. Not because all the great banking houses, trust companies, real estate offices, and corporations have their headquarters on the street but because it is the center around which the great commercial institutions of the country largely cluster.

one of the principal financial agents for the American government in its war in the North and South, and who is president of the peace society, a banker by profession, an expert by attainment, a Methodist in religion takes precisely this view. And all this on patriotic and Christian views at the beginning of the war in Europe. Wall street was one boiling caldron of excitement. But time has shown its softening influence and whatever may be personal desires this is true, that the frightful, ghastly and unequal slaughter, wounds, suffering and ruin has made men in every walk of life stand with bated breath and pray that its end may quickly come.

How a Nation Lives. A nation does not live by munitions of war, their manufacture, storage or use alone. It lives on constructive things, by its oil wells, coal fields, iron mines, cotton growth, sugar production, cattle industry and all those things which go to the bodily well-being and growth of man. So Wall street and its surroundings stand for the produce exchange, the cotton exchange, the sugar, tea and coffee trades, about which the general public hears much and knows little. Few persons know the large range of difference in quality of sugar, tea, coffee or rice. To most people sugar is sugar and coffee is coffee. But sugar is not sold by the brokers and importers alone by the pound. It is sold on a guaranteed stated quality. Some sugars have very low sweetening power, and some very high. It is plain that the sugar of seventy per cent sweetening power is not worth as much as a sugar at ninety-four per cent and so whenever sale is made the quality of sugar to be delivered is stated and guaranteed, and the agents of sale and the great refiners have each chemists who test sugar on delivery for the one side and on its acceptance for the other.

New York Exchange. The New York Stock Exchange is centered from Broad street hard by Wall street. Its governing body is one of the most technically expert on its own lines on the earth. Its membership covers every commercial interest on the continent. And its transactions reach to every part of the known world. It has long list of stocks and bonds in which it trades. And in the business transactions of the combined world there are not each month as many agreements, purchases and sales made by word of mouth. Not all shred of written evidence being executed, which agreements, purchases and sales are so honorably kept. No man may vacate his obligation or put off its performance on any excuse or pretense what ever without instant loss of commercial and money credit. This I am now saying is not the general opinion concerning Wall street, but it is true notwithstanding. The men of Wall street and what it stands for have no use for a knave or a fool, when they know him to be such. Mere cleverness unless combined with integrity loses cast.

Popular Idea of Street. The question then rises how is it that Wall street in the popular mind is considered in a nefarious light? The answer is clear. There are adroit, able and attractive men who hold out glittering prospects of wealth to be gained by what they describe as investment, but which on final investigation proves to be mere speculation. And sometimes the word gambling would be a better word to use concerning it. These men are supported by persons all over the republic who have made money. And they send it to buy generally unlisted stocks of more than doubtful standing. If the man from the country towns makes money, he pats himself on the chest and says "see what a good boy I am." It takes ability to deal in futures. On the other hand, if he loses the money he has put up he says, "what an awful lot of swindlers there are in New York. They deserve to be taken out to the nearest tree and hanged." Wall street and its surroundings like every other street and their surroundings, has men in it, men of varied ability and of varied character. But whoever deals with honorable firms finds honorable people. When the late J. P. Morgan was before the Senate investigating committee in Washington, he had neither burned his books nor forgotten the names of the men with whom he had done business. And he said in reply to a question, "in all my life I have never knowingly misled or deceived any person in a business transaction. I have always regarded and I now regard personal character as one of the best business possessions." The statement of this man was reported throughout the civilized world, and at the time was not questioned. His house has for the period of the European war been business agent for the allies. And the chief instrument in arranging the war loan. The present J. P. Morgan called into consultation some of the foremost living men. Amongst them was J. J. Hill, of St. Paul, Minn. Mr. Hill is, and probably will be known, as the great empire builder in the western part of this republic. It was his genius mainly that built the great northern railway from St. Paul to Seattle and opened up that vast empire tributary to the road. No man ever put money into his plans and lost it. His genius has been constructive, by acclaim stands the first citizen of his state and of the West. His genius has enriched many and made it possible for millions to become well off.

Hill and the West. There is no more prosperous community in the world which lives by agricultural enterprises than that in our western states. Very large numbers of these people are Germans by descent. They are the warm personal friends of J. J. Hill, who was called into advise on the war loan to the allies. And he said that as a business and ethical proposition seen in the lights of our laws and our world-wide relationship it was a wise thing to do. It was for the good of Europe, for the good of the United States. And in the long run would prove a blessing to the world. Young John D. Rockefeller is a man of promise and importance in the business world. With every opportunity to be a rake and a scrape grace he despises that character. He goes to the Baptist church, he says his prayers, he teaches in the Sunday school, he is an example of personal character to young men in the nation. In Wall street and its surroundings the moral changes in the personal character of the men in the last ten years may be described as wonderful. The young men in business hours do not go to saloons, or billiard holes. They attend strictly to business and they see that by so doing that they are creating for themselves the certainty of usefulness in larger places than those they occupy and so securing a larger reward than that they now obtain.




