RELIGIOUS WORK IN WALL STREET

(By "Bishop" William Wilkin-on.) New York City is in the business world looked upon as the center of our national trade. Wall Street in the eyes of the general public stands as the center of the city. Between Ninth street and the Battery every business day in the year it is believed there are more than four hundred thousand men. At the head of Wall street stands the great historic church of Trinity parish, which belongs to one of the oldest and most historic foundations in the republic. Its official representatives numbered in its lists men whose name can only be forgotten when the story of New York is lost.

To the splendor of its historic glory by the grace of God it is adding new achievements day by day. Under the direction of the Rev. Thomas William Mann, D. D., it is reaching out to the surging population of the city as never before. All its churches are open daily that the weary may rest, think and pray. The parish has thirty clergy in conference service. One of its worthy efforts is the open air noon worship and sermons, usually at Broad and Wall streets. This has become in all New York an institution.

The Rev. William Wilkinson, who is parish missionary, has charge of all these services and does all the preaching except on very rare occasions when some man is advertised to help. The worship always begins with the Apostles' creed, with prayers of collects taken from the Book of Common Prayer. There is no music, instrumental or vocal. The speaker always takes a text, and the texts are arranged so as to form a

series of subjects, intimately related each to the other. They are never on controversial subjects. They never deal with things as matters of knowledge which do not admit of proof. The plain, prominent position of the church is always marked. And a broad line is seen between what is of knowledge and so can be proved as a problem in mathematics can be solved. And what is of faith which in its very nature does not admit of such verification but by Christians is most surely believed. Though not demonstrable is yet reasonable because the things believed are in the highest probability true. Hence, at this service are rung out the words, "I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth." Out of which all possible things spring. God, man, the family, law, duty, transgression, the incarnation of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, repentance for sins, full and perfect forgiveness, grace to live well, the duty of public and private worship, the sacraments of the church are all set forth in simple words with which every man in the congregation has known from his boyhood days. Illustration is freely used. Because it is said of Jesus without a parable spake He not unto them. And Tennyson said: "When truth in closet words shall fall, that truth embodied in a tale, will enter in at open doors." And so the preacher ransacks the history, old and new, in every department of human life for examples. The more picturesque and striking they are giving either warning or furnishing example the better is the use made of them. Often the ludicrous sup-

plies a lesson. Often the selfish. As when the father of the maiden described in the Book of Genesis seeing the men who had come to see a wife for Isaac had with them earrings of gold and bracelets of gold, said "Come in ye blessed of the Lord, why tarry ye without?" The earrings of gold and bracelets of gold alike in ancient day and modern times have opened many exclusive doors. The tax-gatherer up a tree as described in gospel story, is a peculiarly striking figure and so in simple words familiar pictures and striking instances great moral and religious truths are taught. Rich men are never flattered because they are rich; nor struggling men because they are many.

In the Wall street service man as man stands in his great human, mental characteristics, desires, struggles, defects or victories. Knight should be sold at public sale or otherwise and the proceeds thereof spent for the education, maintenance and support of the said Erel May Knight, daughter of the said John C. Knight, a lunatic, and for the maintenance, sustenance and support of Ada B. Knight, the wife of the said John C. Knight, a lunatic.

Sixth, and to report such other matters and things as any party in interest may require, the same being pertinent.

At which time and place you are required to attend with such evidence as will enable me to comply with said order of the court.
