Pickled Peas. One-half peck peas, two pounds brown sugar, one ounce whole cloves, one-ounce stick cinnamon, one pint vinegar; stick eight cloves in each pear and boil them in the syrup till easily pierced with a straw. Boil down the syrup and pour over them hot.

Cabbage, Norwegian Style. Shave cabbage very fine; mix with it salt and pepper and sour cream to moisten well; put in double boiler and cook over boiling water until it melts down. Serve piping hot.

It is claimed that cabbage is very digestible this way and that convalescents can eat it prepared in this way without harm.


