CHINESE REPUBLIC'S FATE IS IN QUESTION

State Council of That Country Thinks Matter Will Be Decided Present Year.

PEKING, Nov. 4.—The question whether China is to be a monarchy or a republic should be settled before the end of the year, according to the state council, which has recommended that, in accordance with the terms of the provisional constitution, President Yuan Shi-kai should call a citizen's convention to decide the question, but if it is not possible to call such a convention at this time, the state council recommends that the president waive the provision and "devise other proper and adequate means to consult the will of the people."

It is rumored that this is designed to permit the president to convert the council of state into a convention and have it adopt a new constitution embracing the monarchical provision, according to his wishes.

The memorandum sent by the state council, sitting as a legislature or parliament under the president's direction, says that in all the eighty-two petitions favoring a monarchy have been received from different bodies.

The memorandum is taken as a general indication that the monarchy

may be established much sooner than has been predicted. President Yuan Shi-kai, however, has not taken any action.

Many of the papers printed in English in various foreign concessions continue to vigorously assail the proposed monarchy on the ground that it is especially dangerous for China to make any change while world politics is at such white heat. Other papers printed in English accept the monarchical movement as inevitable, and are urging that wholesale reforms be carried on by the government regardless of whether it be called a republic or a monarchy.

Members of the society for the preservation of peace, the organization that originally fathered the monarchical movement, are still working actively in Peking without opposition from the government. They recently held a luncheon at the most prominent foreign hotel in Peking in honor of delegates from the provinces who have come to the capital to confer about the monarchical proposition. This luncheon was attended by one hundred and fifty men. No member of the cabinet was present, neither did any other government officials of high rank attend. The delegates formed a sort of a union for the discussion of governmental questions, and engaged in speech-making for several hours.

Foreign criticism of the movement and the general belief that several foreign powers would withhold their recognition of the monarchy have nettled the leaders.

An editorial in the Peking Daily News discussing foreign critics says "they mistake the shadow for the substance, raise dolorous cries when it is proposed to give an authentic definition to China's system of government, and to abandon the pretence that it is republicanism. It is putting our credulity to too severe a strain to ask us to believe that two hundred and fifty million people in China would be frantically indignant if it were decided to describe correctly the system of government under which order has been brought out of chaos. To speak frankly, China is enjoying the monarchical system today, but the country deserves itself as a republic and consequently the system would fall to pieces on the death of the ruler if no

The opponents of the monarchical system estimate one hundred million dollars, or about forty million dollars in gold, as the probable expense of restoring a monarchy, but the proponents saw that this big figure is based on the cost of enthrone in ancient time.

When a new emperor came to the throne in China, he always remitted the land for the year of his enthrone. These taxes alone make up for the greater part of the one hundred million dollar estimate. Yang Yu and other leaders of the society for the preservation of peace say it will not be necessary under present conditions to remit the land tax for enthrone year.

GOOD BOOKS ARE NEEDED BY BELGIANS

Who Are Now in the Hospitals of War in France and Great Britain.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Among the thousands of Belgian soldiers now in hospitals in England and in France, detained in camps in Holland and prisoners in Germany, there is a widespread need of good books, and a committee that has been formed to enlist American aid in the matter announces that books or money for their purchase will be received by Pierre Mall, Belgian consul general in New York. The members of the honorary committee include Emmanuel Havenith, the Belgian minister at Washington; Joseph H. Choate, Charles J. Bonaparte, the Rev. J. F. Stilleman, of the Belgian relief fund, and Louis de-Sadeler, minister of state for Belgium, who is in New York.

A statement given out by the committee reads:

"The heroism of the Belgian soldiers has won universal admiration. Thousands of them are now in hospitals in England and in France, detained in camps in Holland, and prisoners in Germany.

"Suffering and deprived of liberty, without news from their relatives now somewhere in poverty or dead, the anxiety of those brave men must be most painful.

"Well educated as they are, and without recreations any intelligent person is looking for, nothing can do more to alleviate their sufferings than literature in their own language.

"There is a real need among those Belgian soldiers for books in French and Flemish, and to a certain extent in English (especially works of travel and novels, and to a certain extent in English (especially works of travel and novels, history, books on electricity, mechanics, motoring, etc., and illustrated magazine of all kinds; also grammars for the study of English; French-English dictionaries and vice-versa.)"
