musical numbers, and expects an indefinite run in New York City.

"The Maid of the Wild," a three act society drama, is at the top of the Bijou program today. A Wallingford comedy, "Trapped for a Trap," in two big acts with Max Pegman and Durr McIntosh doing the funny stunts, is a good one. A Pathe Daily News closes the bill.

Monday will be Triangle day again. Dorothy Gish and a few high class stars will be seen in "Old Heidelberg." It is a Griffith five-act production, so it will be good. The comedy end of the bill will be Eddie Foy and the siren Little Foys in "A Favorite Fool." Manager Smeral says Triangle feature films have come to Clarksburg to stay.

Isabel Irving has left the cast of "The Great Lover," in which she had but a small part. She is going to Los Angeles to be engaged with her husband, William H. Thompson, in picture work.

"The Tenderfoot," as presented at the Palace by the Lewis-Oliver players, a feature being a representation of the little city of Juarez, Mexico, during carnival time. The play abounds in comedy and melodramatic situations. Miss Nelda Gibson as "Panita," a Spanish girl, does some excellent acting. Jack Lewis as "Val Brandon," in quest of adventure, who without a doubt receives more than his share of it, is at his best. Miss Edna Grandin, Fred Beaudoin and the others are happily cast and give excellent interpretations of their respective roles.

FAST BASKETBALL EXPECTED IN NEWLY ORGANIZED LEAGUE

League Composed of Six Centrally Located High School Teams.

WALLACE, Dec. 11.—Great interest is already being manifested in the race for the basketball championship in the newly formed Central High School Athletic League. Every school in the league is to be represented by a husky set of young men

and they are all "out for blood."

The league is composed of the high schools of West Milford, Jane Lew, Bristol, Lumberport, Wallingford and Reader. None of these institutions maintain football teams and consequently all are boiling over with athletic enthusiasm and will no doubt start the season with a lot of "pep." Some two or three of the schools have already been practicing for weeks and will start the season in typical mid-season form. As a result competent observers say that these minor high schools will exhibit a variety of basketball of surprising excellence.

It is still too early in the season to predict the outcome of the race for the trophy cup of the league. There are no sure bets, except that certain teams will play high class basketball.

Bristol High is one team that looks good. Saturday night it won the first game of its schedule by taking the strong Jan Lew team into camp by a score of 42 to 22. Jane Lew had previously defeated the strong West High team. This would indicate that Coach Henderson, of Bristol, already has a fast, well balanced team.

West Milford has also registered a victory over Jane Lew by a score of 22 to 14 and this shows them to be no mean contenders for the league leadership.

Little can be said as to the strength of the other teams as they have not yet been seen in action in league games. Lumberport High in a previous season game registered a victory over the Wallace lads last Saturday night by a score of 43 to 9. But Wallace was handicapped by the absence of Captain Robey and was wholly without practice. Indeed, this team last year swamped the Wheeling Young Men's Christian Association Intermediate team 64 to 14, and this team claimed the championship of the upper Ohio valley in the 139 pound class. Wallace will have practically the same team this year and should be formidable when it gets going good. It will be handicapped, however, by a late start, having been delayed by construction of a gymnasium. Reader High is another team which has not been seen in action this year. Last year in not infrequently played Magnolia High and other strong teams to close scores. A line on it will be gotten when it meets Bristol High Saturday night.
