OIL AND GAS DEVELOPMENT OF TRI-STATE

Latest Reports of Operations in West Virginia, Pennsylvania and Ohio.

The old year expired without presenting any thrills in the eastern fields. The lethargy that prevailed during the holiday season continued, but will give place to activity during the new year. The market has now reached a point that will inspire operators to start more new work and make an effort to get a little more production from the old wells. The search for new producing territory will be limited during the winter months, but promises to be a feature early in the spring.

On Sheats Run, Union district, Pleasant county, Eddy and Company drilled No. 3 on the M. Miller farm through the sand and developed a gasser. On Keller Run, Ellisworth district, the Reno Oil Company completed No. 9 on the J. A. Matheny farm and secured a gasser in the Big Injun sand. On Union district, the same company drilled a second test on the J. T. Hugas farm through the Salt sand and got but a small showing of oil. It will be abandoned.

Light Pumps in Pleasants. In the Eureka district, Pleasants county, the Creek Oil Company completed No. 9 on the J. A. Matheny farm and No. 4 on the J. W. H. Corwell farm, and both are light pumps. In the same district the Bills Oil Company completed a test on the C. H. Bartlett farm and has a very light pump. The same company is drilling a second test on the S. Hammett farm. Girard and Company are drilling near the top of the sand at a test on the H. Russell farm.

In the Saint Marys district, the White Oil Company is drilling a test on the L. Gardner farm and the New York Petroleum Company is fishing at its test on the M. Kidder farm. The South Penn Oil Company and the American Oil Development Company have a ten-barrel pumper at their No. 4 on the T. A. Campbell farm. In McKim district Bishop and Company have the rig completed for another test on the T. A. Davis farm. In Washington district, the Orhard Oil Company is starting a test on the S. E. Bills farm. Near Calcutta, Jefferson district, the Wallace Oil Company is due in the Big Injun sand at a second test on the Wade Hanlin farm. In Lafayette district, Martin and Company are drilling a test on the G. B. Jones farm.

Southeastern Ohio. In the deep sand territory in southeastern Ohio, located in the northeast quarter of section 18, Green township, Hocking county, the Blennerhassett Oil and Gas Company drilled No. 8 on the David Brian farm through the Clinton sand. This location is 600 feet north of the Preston Oil Company's No. 6 on the Ellis J. Price farm and shows for a fifteen or twenty-barrel producer. The most important test starting in this section of the deep sand territory is the Chambers Oil Company's well on the
