

Sketches of Little OLD NEW YORK by W.M. Intyre

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Winnie Sheehan, who was one of Charles Chaplin's star men on the world, has illustrated a doubling Park Row what a stepping stone a journalistic career really is. He stepped from the World to the private secretaryship to Police Commissioner Waldo that was.
