RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN CAPITAL AND LABOR

The great number of strikes or "walkouts" in nearly all the various industries of the country shows only too plain that there is a great deal of needless and uncalculated antagonism between capital and labor; and I am inclined to believe that the almost unfaithful gulf that seems to be fixed between them, is largely imaginary, and a hallucination of the mind.

This age of commercialism seems to have destroyed man's reasoning powers and has placed him in the category of a mad man.

A few days ago I overheard a conversation between two laboring men in which one of them remarked, "If the capitalists keep on grinding labor down in their wages, while the cost of living is soaring out of reach of the common laboring man, I don't see how we are to live at all; and Socialism is the only thing that can save us."

Now this talk is nothing new; it has been talked so much that it is their dream by day and by night, and it is their fixed purpose to believe it.

But permit me to submit a few figures to compare the prevailing conditions that obtain today, with the conditions of twenty to thirty years ago, before the great strike system was inaugurated in our country.

As I have kept a record of my expense account much of the time in past years, I can refer to the price of commodities in back years with some degree of accuracy; and with the exception of the one article of meat, the wage scale of that day would buy no more provisions at the

SCHEDULE FOR 1916 MARIETTA ELEVEN

is Much Better Than Last Year's Schedule. Ten Games Will Be Played.

Marietta college will stack up against a schedule next year that will include some of the best teams in the country. Marietta has steadily been coming forward in all lines of athletics in the last few years and the 1916 football schedule is a step in advance of the one of last year. Marietta lost four regulars by graduation, but there is a host of good material in the under classes, which, with a little seasoning will be of great help to Coach Drumm in his moulding of another great team for the Blue and White.

The three most important away-from-home games are Michigan University, Washington and Jefferson, and West Virginia Wesleyan. These three teams have a nationwide reputation and Coach Drumm is to be congratulated on having secured the games with them.

Among the home games are Wabash, Kenyon, Davis-Elkins and Bethany, while the Marshall game has not been decided as to place.

A game will probably be arranged with the Ohio University, but as yet nothing definite has been done. West

Virginia University will not likely appear on Marietta's schedule next year. Following is the schedule: September 8 to 20—Training camp on Dana farm. September 30.—Davis-Elkins at home. ned with the prevailing conditions in this region; and they have a right to be; their wage enables them to live well, support a moving picture show six nights in the week; spend much money on street cars, and still have plenty to spend for booze.

So much for the difference between unionized and non-unionized mining districts. All might be happy if there were not paid agitators to disquiet them. At this critical moment when all the world has gone mad, and such efforts are being made to annihilate the human race, we would try to inculcate a spirit of harmony and love one towards another. And more especially such a state exist between capital and labor, as they are so closely related and neither of them could prosper without the other, for without labor none of our commercial industries could be developed, and our country would be a barren wilderness, and without capital being invested in very large chunks we would be in practically the same condition. So, instead of enmity, resulting in strikes and wars, the loss of life, property and much time wasted, the most cordial feeling between them should prevail.

Louis D. Brandies, the recently appointed associate justice of the supreme court, goes on record as saying that an eight hour day is too long for working men, and their wage is too low. He seems to favor a six hour day at about \$1 per hour. Let all our industries employing labor adopt the scale, then where would the cost of living soar to? Those receiving the wage might be able to reach it, but what would become of the widows and orphans, or the millions who by age or other infirmities are incapacitated for performing labor of any kind? Let us think on these things.
