Wilson to Blame. Everyone with real knowledge of the Mexican situation regards President Wilson as entirely responsible for this latest development, including the loss of seventeen more American lives. As has been pointed out to him over and over again, not alone by Republicans but by well-informed Democrats, he ought long ago to have done what he is now doing, namely, order an expedition to punish the perpetrators of outrages on Americans. Instead, as Senator Root pointed out, Mr. Wilson petted and cajoled the bandits, Villa and Carranza, and intervened in Mexico, not to protect the rights of Americans or to punish those who had murdered American men and outraged American women, but to drive Huerta out of the presidency, which he accomplished by his landing troops in Vera Cruz.

This interference in the internal affairs of Mexico destroyed the belief of Mexicans in the good faith of the United States and won for it only their contempt. As Mr. Root put it, "the government of the United States ignored, condoned the murder of American men and the rape of American women and destruction of American property and insult to American officers and the defilement of the American flag, and joined itself to the men who were guilty of all these things to pull down the power of Huerta."

Wilson Acts. After three years of "watchful waiting," as a result of which the United States has become a byword in Mexico and an object of contempt in Europe, President Wilson has ordered American troops into Mexico to capture and punish the bandits, headed by Mr. Wilson's willful friend and protegee, "General" Villa, who shot up the town of Columbus, N. M., killing some sixteen Americans, soldiers and civilians.

American soldiers, by order of General Pershing—and in violation of the order of President Wilson—crossed into Mexico in pursuit of Villa and his gang, but because the troops were inadequately prepared for such an expedition, having no automobile supply wagons, they were compelled to return when almost in sight of the bandits.

President Wilson, on receiving the news from New Mexico, instructed that Carranza's ambassador in Washington be asked to secure Carranza's permission for American troops to pursue Villa and his band. Soon afterwards, however, word came that, without waiting for permission from Washington, General Pershing had ordered the pursuit.

Army officers are by no means surprised at Villa's raid on Columbus, which they attribute to Villa's personal hatred of, and a desire to be revenged on, Mr. Wilson. They point out that the president petted and cajoled Villa, overlooked and excused his outrages on Americans and other foreigners, facilitated his procuring arms and ammunition and flattered him by keeping Special Agent Carothers constantly with him, so that it was fully a week after Mr. Wilson had recognized Carranza before Villa could actually realize that his patron in the White House had thus repudiated and betrayed him. Being a professional bandit, without morals and with a low order of intelligence, Villa can no longer perceive no reason why he should not revenge himself for such treachery by killing every American he can reach.

WEST VIRGINIA BRIEFS

WEBSTER SPRINGS: Beekeepers of the state at a meeting here organized the West Virginia Beekeepers' Association. Statistics were offered showing that West Virginia produces the highest grade of honey in the United States. H. B. Kelley, of Cowen, is president; and L. W. Starcher, of Boland, secretary-treasurer.

MORGANTOWN: Frank Lee, of Fairmont, for the last two years center on the state university basketball team, has been elected captain of the 1917 five by the toss of a coin following a tie vote between him and William Morrison, the sturdy guard from Sutton high school.

SISTERSVILLE: While on his honeymoon, Henry W. McCoy, 46, the wealthiest resident of Tyler county, died at Clermont, Fla. His bride was formerly Miss Nell Burns. Mr. McCoy was identified with practically every business enterprise here. He was a thirty-second degree Mason.

ELKINS: For the murder of his wife, Mrs. Blanche Wamsley, of Mill Creek, this county, on New Year's day, 1915, Floyd Wamsley was found guilty by a jury of first degree murder but mercy was recommended, which means that he will receive a life sentence in the penitentiary. Following the shooting of Mrs. Wamsley, the husband fled to the mountains and remained in hiding six months.

PARKERSBURG: The Master Plumbers' Association of West Virginia, will hold its annual state convention March 21 and 22 in this city and an elaborate program is being arranged for the occasion. R. S. MOUNDSVILLE: Because of the illness of his daughter, C. E. Chalfant, a Mason county prisoner of the state penitentiary here, was released so that he could go to her bedside, on orders from Governor H. D. Hatfield. Chalfant was found guilty of embezzlement in connection with the sale of oil well stock, and in order to get off with a minimum sentence he pleaded guilty and was given one year in the penitentiary. His sentence had three months more to run, but Governor Hatfield released him unconditionally.


