West Virginia Briefs

PARKERSBURG: The Democratic state executive committee in session here decided to hold the state convention of the party for the purpose of nominating two candidates for the state supreme bench, write a party platform and select presidential electors, Wednesday, August 2, in this city.

GRAFTON: Virgil Cathel, aged 16, son of William Cathel, a Baltimore & Ohio railroad engineer, was run down and killed by a helper engine near his home at Newburg.

CHARLESTON: Elections have been called for May 21 in London and Big Sandy districts of Kanawha county for bond elections so that road improvements costing \$350,000, can be made. In districts of Monongalia county elections will be held Wednesday, May 17, to determine where the voters wish the establishment of two new high schools.

MARTINSBURG: The decomposed body of William Mechtel, the heroic 12-year-old boy who lost his life while attempting to rescue his 10-

year-old brother, Jack, from drowning in the Potomac river at Sir John Run, west of here, on April 18, was found in the river near Martinsburg, 25 miles below the point where the boys lost their lives. The body of the other lad is still missing. An effort will be made to secure recognition for the widowed mother from the Carnegie Hero Commission, as her boy refused to abandon his drowning brother and swim to safety. The mother lost her husband and all six children by death within two years.

CHARLESTON: A health survey under the direction of the State Department of Health is being made along the Coal and Coke railroad by Dr. H. B. Wood, Blue Creek Clinician, Straupe Creek, Widen Clay, Gassaway and other towns are on the official itinerary. Illustrated talks will be given to school children in each of these towns. A survey of McDowell and Fayette counties has been finished by Dr. Juniata McFarland, who is compiling a report on the health conditions in eight counties.

HUNTINGTON: The West Virginia State Federation of Labor will hold its annual convention in Huntington, beginning Monday, May 8. Delegates are being selected by all the trades unions in the state which are affiliated with this major organization.

CHARLESTON: Columbus Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Ohio, West Virginia and Kentucky, will meet this week in Charleston. The sessions will continue three days, beginning tomorrow. The Rev. D. F. Ebert of Marysville, O., and the Rev. L. H. Berry of Charleston, will be among the speakers.

MARTINSBURG: An entirely new phase of the shooting of Frank B. Paulding, by his younger brother, John T. Paulding here, which resulted in the death of the former, was placed upon the case when the accused man took the witness stand at the inquest held by Coroner Sponsler and swore he acted in self-defense.

CHARLESTON: West Virginia property is valued at \$1,286,569,524 according to figures given out by Fred O. Blue, state tax commissioner, as follows: Real estate, \$691,445,971; personal property, \$274,157,288; public utilities, \$320,966,265.

WHEELING: Miss Clara Kemple, aged 16 years, of this place, died in the North Wheeling hospital as a result of a criminal operation, and B. H. Stillard, negro physician and member of the city council, is in the Wheeling jail accused of performing the operation. Stillard was arrested at his home on a warrant procured by Prosecuting Attorney D. A. McKee of Ohio county. Miss Kemple was a saleswoman in a local department store.

Max Jaffe, bankrupt, No. 1086, Northern District, West Virginia, ss: On the 8th day of April, A. D. 1916, Max Jaffe having presented to this court his petition praying for a discharge and setting forth reason why the same was not presented within 12 months after he was adjudicated bankrupt now on the 12th day of April, 1916.

Ordered by the court that a hearing be had upon the same on the 25th day of May, A. D. 1916, before said court at Clarksburg in said district, at ten o'clock in the forenoon; and that notice thereof be published in the Telegram, a newspaper printed in said District, and that all known creditors and other persons in interest may appear at the said time and place and show cause, if any they have, why the prayer of said petition should not be granted.

And it is further ordered by the court, that the clerk shall send by mail to all known creditors copies of said petition and this order addressed to them at their places of residence as stated.

Witness the Honorable Alton G. Dayton, Judge of the said Court, and the seal thereof, at Clarksburg, in said district, on the 8th day of April, A. D. 1916.
