**WOODEN SHINGLE BAD FIRE HAZARD**

It Comes in for Knocks at the Hands of Association Committee.

CHICAGO, May 9.—Renewed attacks on the wooden shingle were made in a report by the committee on public information to the National Fire Protection Association at its annual meeting here today. The report pointed to recent conflagrations at Paris, Tex., Nashville, Tenn., and Augusta, Ga., as proof that the wooden shingle is a menace. Notwithstanding such proof, the report adds, "our efforts to limit its use have this year met the active opposition of certain lumber dealers."

The report said:

"It is perhaps natural that the economic interest of lumbermen should warp their judgment as to the hazard of this roof-covering, and induce certain of them to assume an attitude hostile to public good. We believe, however, that the lumber industry as a whole is capable of looking at this matter in a large and generous way, and if the present efforts at fire-retardant treatment of wooden shingles should fail of technical or economic success, that they will join with the forces of fire prevention in limiting the uses of wood to those forms in which it is superior and capable of protection from fire.

"In the continuation of our efforts to fix legal liability upon the careless or indifferent fire-breeder, we have been strikingly successful," the committee says. "It was positively predicted by members for whose opinion we have a profound respect that ten years' educational effort must precede any recognition of this principle of personal liability in American law as applied to preventable fires. But we have the assurance of the attorneys-general of such states as Massachusetts, Ohio and Michigan that this legal liability already resides in the common law and anybody suffering from the negligence of a careless neighbor has but to bring suit to recover damages where negligence can be shown. A statute is unnecessary for this object, and we need seek, therefore, only to extend the principle embodied in the charter of greater New York which fixes the cost of extinguishing preventable fires upon the indifferent citizen. In this direction during the year we have accomplished something. The state of Pennsylvania, by legislative act for cities of the second class, and the city of Cleveland, O., by ordinance, now impose legal liability for the cost of ex-

tinguishing fires upon citizens disobeying fire prevention orders. These enactments, the direct result of our efforts, give us the inestimable advantage of a great state and a leading American city officially recognizing the principle for which we contend. A similar ordinance is now before the city councils of other cities in which we hope for success, and in which the public discussions of the measure have already been of great educative value. The foundation is already laid, therefore, for a direct and positive influence upon the fire waste as soon as we can fully develop the fire department inspection service which is so rapidly extending and which will furnish the basis for legal action."
