Loot Store at Brown and Get Away with Money and Merchandise.

CROSS BORDER

Do Two Troops of the Eighth Cavalry and Are Headed toward Brigands' Camps.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) MARATHON, Tex., May 11.—Major Langhorne with his two troops of the Eighth cavalry crossed the Rio Grande into Mexico last night and are making their way rapidly southward today.

They have with them the three Mexican bandits who were captured by the employees of the Porto Rico de Boquillas to guide the column to the camp of the brigands who are supposed to be about twelve hours' march inland. It is reported that J. Deemer, an American storekeeper, who was kidnapped, is being held a prisoner at this camp. A company of coast artillery of approximately 150 men has been ordered here to guard the line of communication.

WAGE INCREASE

Is Granted to 5,000 Employees of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) DENVER, Colo., May 11.—Five thousand employees of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company's steel mill at Pueblo have been granted an increase in wages, adding \$40,000 to the company's monthly payroll, according to announcement by officials of the company here today. The increase effective May 1 average approximately ten per cent. A similar increase was granted last February.
