BOND ISSUE

Election for Good Roads in Simpson District is Being Considered by Court.

The county court convened at 2:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon to consider a petition of Simpson district taxpayers for authority to hold an election in the district to determine whether a bond issue of \$200,000 shall be issued by the district for permanent roads. The court will likely set a date for the election.

The plan is to build good roads as follows: In Bridgeport 2.76 miles, on the Philippi road east of Grassell two miles, on the Samuel S. Faris road two miles, on the Fairmont pike extending out of Bridgeport two miles, down Simpson's creek from Bridgeport to the M. R. Lodge residence two miles, from the West Fork river at Meadowbrook toward the Henry McCord farm two miles, and from Grassell along the street car line to the Faris road 2.75 miles.

ITALIANS TO BUILD CATHOLIC CHURCH

RYE HAY

Cutting Time is Explained by William D. Zinn, the County Agent.

More than fifty farmers have called on the county agent during the last few days to know at what stage they should cut their rye for hay.

The growing of rye for hay is such a new thing that our stations have little or no data on the subject. W. D. Zinn, the writer, has cut it when it was just coming in head, when all the heads were out and when in bloom and it is his opinion, though he cannot prove it by any station reports, that it will be relished more and digested better if it is cut about the time it comes into head. A greater tonnage, however, will be obtained if the rye is left until about ready to come into bloom. A great many fields should be cut this week. Some that was sown late or over until next week and possibly until the last of the same. It does not seem to be injured much by getting wet though, of course, it is desirable to put it up without rain if possible. It may be stacked outside but like all other rough food it is better if housed.

NEW FIXTURES

Are Installed in Local Offices of Western Union Telegraph Company.

New counters, partitions, cupboards and other equipment have been installed in the Western Union Telegraph Company's local office in the Waldo building, adding much to the comfort and convenience of the place both to customers and employees.

Messenger boys have a private dressing room, linemen have cupboards and shelves provide storage space for blanks, old telegrams and other supplies. A large public lobby is provided in front with a long counter and private desks for the use of customers. The work is of the best and the improvements make at line showing.

PLANTS RE-OPEN

In the City of Youngstown with Wages Increased to Considerable Extent.

YOUNGSTOWN, O., May 16.—The plant of the Republic Rubber Company, closed since April 23, when the management announced it would not operate in view of the "excessive demands of labor," re-opened this morning and the company claimed 550 of its 1,250 employees returned to work. The plant of the General Fireproofing Company, closed by a machinists' strike, also reopened today. More men went back to the plants of the Trussed Concrete Company, where a strike is on, the management said. There was no trouble at any point.

The Girard Iron Company announced a wage advance to 1,000 employees today. Half of them are laborers who will get twenty-five cents instead of twenty-two cents an hour. The others are puddlers and finishers who are raised by the recent wage settlement from \$7.40 to \$7.42 1-2 a ton.

DAVID MORGAN DEAD.

David Morgan, a well known stockman and farmer, died at his home near Mt. Clare Tuesday morning after a long illness. Mr. Morgan was one of the oldest men of that section. He leaves a large circle of friends to mourn his loss as he was very popular. No funeral arrangements have been made yet.

Fund of \$10,000 for the Purpose is Started Off with Nearly \$1,100.

The Reverend Father Francis Laurenzano has been here for one week and it seems that during that short time he has been able to captivate the Italian colony by his attainment, tact and untiring efforts in the work for the spreading of the Holy Seed.

Sunday night he held a conference on East Main street which was the first of a series of such conferences and in a gathering of fifty he succeeded in securing a subscription of nearly 1,100. At the gathering a number of the most prominent Italians were appointed on a subscription committee and it may not be an exaggerated statement at this time to say that \$10,000 will be readily subscribed to for the purpose of building the said church.

Father Laurenzano is an enthusiastic speaker and readily infuses his audience with enthusiasm. It is a pleasure to hear him and the writer feels confident of the success of the enterprise headed by the Rev. Father Laurenzano.

UNIFICATION

Of Two Methodist Denominations is Endorsed by the General Conference.

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., May 16.—The unification of the Methodist Episcopal church and the Methodist Episcopal church, South, was endorsed almost unanimously by the Methodist general conference Tuesday. The conference adopted the report of the committee on unification which provided for further negotiations with the southern church paving the way for final action by the general conference of the southern church in 1918 and by the northern church's general conference in 1920.

NEW ARMY

Will Be Even Larger Than That Announced When Agreement Was Reached.

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Revised figures on the army reorganization bill as agreed upon by House and Senate conferees and submitted to the Senate Tuesday by Chairman Chamberlain show that the new army will be even larger than announced when agreement was reached last Saturday.

Careful analysis shows the maximum strength in time of peace will be 211,000 officers and men including 25,000 staff troops, Philippine scouts and unassigned recruits and that the war strength will be 236,500 officers and combatant troops which with staff troops, scouts, etc., added will bring the maximum strength of the regular army up to 261,500. The national guard as reorganized would total 457,000, making a total of 718,500 available.

WRIT

Of Mandamus is Awarded Lilly by the Supreme Court or West Virginia.

CHARLESTON, May 16.—An alternative writ of mandamus was awarded in the supreme court Tuesday on petition of Attorney General A. A. Lilly, who as a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, asked that the Cabell county court be compelled to revise the list of officials named to conduct the primary election June 9. The writ is returnable May 23. Mr. Lilly claimed that the chairman named election officers who did not meet the wishes of the other members.

TROOPS ENTRAIN

For Home as They Are No Longer Needed in Former Strike Zone.

PITTSBURGH, May 16.—Brigadier General A. J. Logan Tuesday ordered the Sheridan troop of Tyrone and Troop 1, of Sunbury, who have been on strike duty in East Pittsburg, to enroute troops of Harrisburg home duty also were issued pending the government troops of Harrisburg home tomorrow, leaving Troop H of Pittsburg the only military command on duty. It will likely be relieved before the end of the week.

EXHIBITION

In Buenos Aires in the Month of July is to Be Big.

BUENOS AIRES, May 16.—The committee in charge of the organization of the National Centenary Exhibition, to be held in the month of July, is now in full operation. The exhibition will be held in the spacious building situated at Florida and Sarmiento streets.

A large number of local industrial and commercial firms, also a number of North American, Brazilian and Uruguayan concerns have signified their intention of participating.

VERDICT IS RENDERED BY CORONER'S JURY

Holds Traction Company and Employes Responsible for Dagman's Death.

The following verdict was rendered Tuesday morning by the coroner's jury that investigated the death of Virgil Digman, who was killed on East Pike street recently when run down by a street car of the Monongahela Valley Traction Company:

"The said Virgil Digman came to his death on May 1, 1916, in Clarksburg, Harrison county, West Virginia, by being hit by street car 76 of the Monongahela Valley Traction Company and thereby killed. From the evidence the jury further finds that the accident was due to neglect on the part of Conductor B. A. Frum and Motorman E. A. Strader, and the Monongahela Valley Traction Company in that the said car was exceeding the speed limit and their failure to stop the car in reasonable distance, and we the jury further recommend that the street car company operating in this county be required to equip all its cars with air brakes and fenders and observe the speed limit, and further recommend that the city officials enforce ordinances relating to the speed laws and pedestrians."
