John Murray Gibbon, a quiet but observing Canadian, has just given London something besides the war to think about, in the latest product of his pen, "Hearts & Faces." Full of shrewd, pointed description and biting irony, Gibbon's "Hearts & Faces" has invited the world to gaze upon the intimate life of several persons internationally famous and well-known in the daily life of the British metropolis. The book has been brought to New York to be published. Gibbon's life reads like a romance. He was born in Ceylon, the son of a titled Scot, educated in Glasgow; given a degree, "Cum Laude," at

Christ Church (where King Edward was schooled), Oxford; admitted to classes in German universities and to the art schools of Paris and London, including the famous "Langham"; edited for a time "Black & White," one of London's big magazines; elected an officer of the Circumnavigators' club because of his globe-trotting achievements; author of several historical books, and now on the threshold of new conquests in a field but recently entered. Gibbon lives in the quaint French-Canadian village of St. Anne de Bellevue, Quebec, and is making a record for himself as an official of the Canadian Pacific railway.

READJUSTMENT

Of Wage Scale is Sought by Three Hundred Members of Kiln Drawers Union.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) EAST LIVERPOOL, O., May 16.—Three hundred members of the kiln drawers union here has asked the United States Pottery Association to name a committee to confer with them relative to a re-adjustment of the wage scale. Warehousemen at the potteries in Newell, W. Va., across the Ohio river from here, struck last week and 2,000 potters at Sebring, O., were thrown out of work by a strike of kiln men in the five potteries there.

The United States Pottery Association, which includes the tableware potteries in Newell, W. Va., across agreement with the National Brotherhood of Operative Pottery, which will continue until October 1, 1917, unless it is abrogated through the labor disturbances which have recently appeared in the industry.

PROTEST

Which is Very Vigorous is Being Prepared by the United States Government.

WASHINGTON, May 16.—The American government is preparing a protest characterized by officials as "very vigorous" against the interference with mails to and from the United States and Great Britain. A note to be sent forward in the near future will take the position that the United States can no longer countenance seizure and detention of mails to and from the United States particularly those concerning neutrals.

REYNOLDS

Arrive in Chicago and Opens National Committee Headquarters in Coliseum.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) CHICAGO, May 16.—J. B. Reynolds, secretary Republican national committee, arrived Monday and opened committee headquarters in the Coliseum where the Republican convention will convene June 7.

First attention was directed to getting the contests over delegations in shape for presentation to the whole committee which meets June 1.

Fewer than 50 contests are on file in contrast to the many which were brought before the party's convention four years ago.

WESTCOTT

Consents to Place Woodrow Wilson in Nomination at St. Louis Convention.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, May 16.—President Wilson has asked John W. Westcott, attorney general of New Jersey, who made the speech nominating him at the Baltimore convention, to make the nominating speech at St. Louis. Mr. Westcott has accepted and conferred Monday with the president.

When the president asked Mr. Westcott to make the speech he did not know that the New Jersey delegates on the same day had selected Governor Fielder. In view of the president's wish to have Mr. Westcott it is expected the governor will withdraw.

SHUTDOWN

Of Many Coal Mines in Kentucky Throws 5,000 Miners Out of Work.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) CENTRAL CITY, Ky., May 16.—The Western Kentucky Coal Operators Association Monday issued a notice reciting that all coal mines in western Kentucky under the control of its members would be closed on Tuesday. The shutdown is due to failure of operators and miners in district No. 23 to agree upon working conditions incident to formulating a wage scale for two years.

Approximately 5,000 miners are affected. Leaders of the miners have issued addresses to the men pleading that order be maintained.

KEEP VEHICLES OFF THE PARADE COURSE.

Mayor G. H. Gordon Monday ordered that no vehicles of any kind be allowed to stand on Main and Pike streets from Oak to Chestnut streets from 3 to 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, on account of the Knights Templar parade which will be held on that afternoon.

PROTEST FUNERAL

Is Permitted to Be Held But Not until after a Few Changes Are Made.

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) CLEVELAND, O., May 16.—Police have planned to prevent the holding of union bakers of a "protest" funeral for Joseph Field, 38, striking baker, who was shot and killed last night by pickets at one of the bakeries of Edward Rosen, where a strike is in progress. Union bakers had announced that they would parade carrying the body of Field past all of Rosen's bakeries and his home.

Rosen, his two sons and son-in-law are under arrest charged with Field's murder.

The police finally consented to permit the funeral procession to pass Rosen's residence and stores after they had confiscated two banners bearing the inscription "Rosen's label—the mark of Cain," and "Killed in battle between capital and labor." The pall bearers carried the coffin on their shoulders through crowds which jammed the streets and were held in check by police reserves.
