INDUSTRIAL
Survey of Winnipeg and Many Other Large Canadian Cities is to Be Made.

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS. **WINNIPEG, Canada, May 22—**With a view to finding suitable occupations for disabled Canadian soldiers who have returned from Europe, arrangements have been made for an industrial survey of Winnipeg and many other large cities of Canada.

At a joint meeting here of the Returned Soldiers' Association, the Military Hospitals Commission and the Industrial Bureau for Trade Extension, it was decided to have male teachers from the industrial and technical schools make the survey. Places are to be found not only for men who are disabled by the loss of limbs, but for those who have suffered shattered nerves and are unfit for shop work. Many of the maimed soldiers are handicapped by the lack of education. The officials are trying to overcome this by establishing schools at the various convalescent homes.

West Virginia Briefs

MIDDLEBOURNE: J. D. Garrison, secretary, announces that the state board of education will hold its regular annual meeting June 17-19 in Clarksburg immediately following the annual convention of the West Virginia State Education Association in the same city. It will embrace a conference of institute instruction.

HUNTINGTON: The yield of tobacco in Cabell county this season will be the largest in years owing to the large acreage that has been planted, according to F. O. Sanders, secretary of the Cabell County Agricultural Association. Good prices have encouraged the planting.

HUNTINGTON: An automobile bearing ran wild through the streets when the chauffeur, O. L. Cantrell, got off to crank it. The car plunged through traffic and finally smashed into a roadster owned by Ferguson Thompson. Several persons were injured, but only slightly.

HUNTINGTON: Although a heavy touring car flopped over and pinned them beneath near the Russel creek bridge, S. Bellville, Albert Bellville and Miss Beattie Bellville escaped with slight bruises.

MORGANTOWN: The University of West Virginia leads in the number of graduates from the state educational institutions this year, with 150, the department of schools in Charleston having signed diplomas for these and the following: Fairmont Normal 128 graduates; Marshall College 110, Concord Normal 89, Shepherd College 64, West Virginia Colored Institute 58, West Liberty Normal 51, Glenview Normal 38, Keyser Preparatory 27, Montgomery Preparatory 5, making a total of 756 graduates from the state institutions this year.

CHARLESTON: Governor Hatfield announces the appointment of J. W. Dawson, coal operator of Charleston, to membership on this state's Virginia debt commission. A vacancy has existed since the retirement of John W. Mason, of Fairmont to succeed Judge Ira E. Robinson on the supreme bench. Mr. Dawson is identified with West Virginia politics and is a candidate for delegate to the Republican national convention. Other members of the commission are W. E. Wells, of Newell, chairman; W. T. Lee, Jr., of Philippi, and J. F. Miller, of Kenova. The governor is ex-officio chairman.

PARKERSBURG: The executive committee of the Public Utilities Association of West Virginia is completing arrangements for the annual meeting of the association in this city July 13, 14, 15 and 16. The association embraces practically all of the public utility corporations in the state, including the electric lighting and power companies, the water companies, natural gas, telephone, etc. The executive committee includes M. A. Lawwell, of Logan; P. P. Crafts, of Parkersburg; W. E. Powell, of Huntington; W. C. Davidson, R. A. Schott and E. W. Alexander, of Charleston, and Edwin Markie, of Bluefield.

GRAFTON: Fred O. Blue, tax commissioner, spoke here last evening in the auditorium of the new high school. The city churches dispensed with evening services, and the congregations went to hear Blue's lecture on "Prohibition in West Virginia."

HEREIN AFTER STATED: AND TO LAY A LEVY TO PAY INTEREST ON SAID BONDS, AND TO PROVIDE A SINKING FUND TO PAY SAID BONDS. WHEREAS, It appearing to the said Board of Education of Coal District, Harrison County, West Virginia, (hereinafter called the Board of Education) that in order to provide room for, and properly accommodate the youths of school age residing in said District it is necessary for said Board of Education to borrow the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00), and issue bonds therefor, for the purpose of building, completing, enlarging, repairing and furnishing, as herein after mentioned and specified, school houses in said District;

WHEREAS, The said Board of Education is of the opinion that the maximum rate of levy provided in Section 21, Chapter 46, Code of West Virginia, (1916 Ed.) will not produce sufficient funds to pay the interest on such bonded indebtedness and provide a sinking fund for the discharge of the principal amounts of said bonds in the number of years authorized by the issue

RAILROADERS

Will Hold Their Triennial Convention in City of Denver Beginning June 5.

DENVER, May 22—Questions affecting all phases of railroad work will be considered at the triennial convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers which will open here June 5. A general revision of the constitution and a proposal to select permanent headquarters for the order are among the principal questions to come before the delegates.

The convention roster includes 842 delegates, representing approximately 88,000 members. Sessions are expected to continue for thirty days. W. S. Carter, of Peoria, Ill., is president of the grand lodge. The proposals for constitutional changes include one to reduce the number of delegates by establishing district or state bodies which will select representatives to the national meeting. Another proposes to increase the number of vice presidents by one. O. W. Karn, of San Francisco, has been mentioned for the place in the event this increase is authorized.

Chicago has been discussed in connection with the proposal to fix permanent headquarters for the organization and for triennial conventions. A ten days' convention of the ladies' auxiliary organizations will be held here at the same time with 375 accredited delegates. Visitors to the two meetings are expected to reach 2,000.

of said bonds, and that a maximum rate of levy of seven cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable property in said district will be necessary in each year to pay the interest on said bonds, and to provide such sinking fund therefor, and WHEREAS, The said Board of Education has further determined that the indebtedness to be contracted by the sale of said bonds, including all existing indebtedness, will not, in the aggregate, exceed 2 1/2 per centum per annum of the value of the taxable property in said School District, as ascertained by the last assessment thereof for County and State taxes, and that the total value of taxable property in said School District as shown by said last assessment thereof for county and state taxes is \$8,160,286.00.

1. That the said Board of Education do borrow the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the purposes of building, completing, enlarging, repairing and furnishing, the following school houses in said School District in the following locations in said District, to-wit:

(a) To build, West of Adamston, one new modern two story brick graded school house, including mechanical heating and ventilating system, plumbing, electrical work, furniture and fixtures; complete and ready for occupancy.

(b) At Hepzibah, same kind of building, etc., as above.

(c) To build in East North View one four room brick building, including mechanical heating and ventilating system, plumbing, electrical work, furniture and fixtures; complete and ready for occupancy.

(d) Despard School, near Tin Plate Mill: For finishing this eight room building, including mechanical heating and ventilating system, plumbing, electrical work, furniture and fixtures; complete and ready for occupancy.

(e) The residue of the money, if any be left, is to be used for the purpose of enlarging and furnishing other school houses in said District, at the places most congested with pupils, so as to relieve as far as possible the present overcrowded condition of the schools in said District.

2. To provide more definitely concerning said bonds, it is further ordered that the said Board of Education do issue the same in bonds (to be known as School Building Bonds of 1916) of the principal sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) each, to be numbered consecutively from one (1) to fifty (50), both inclusive, and of the aggregate sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) bearing date on the 1st day of August, 1916, and payable to the bearer on the 1st day of August, 1931, in gold coin of the United States of America, or equal to the present standard of weight and fineness at the Empire National Bank of Clarksburg, West Virginia, with interest thereon from date thereof at the rate of five (5) per centum per annum, payable at such rate and in such manner as the coupons to be attached to said bonds, or if they severally mature. But the said Board of Education shall have the right on any day after the 1st day of August, 1921, to redeem said bonds or any of them, either by paying to the holder or holders thereof the principal sum of the said bonds, or by depositing at said Empire National Bank a sum sufficient to pay the principal sum of such bonds so to be redeemed and the accrued interest thereon to said interest day then remaining unpaid, and in making such payment to said holder or holders thereof the said Board of Education shall be thereby released from any further liability for the payment of the principal sum of, and any interest on, said bonds so to be redeemed. Said bonds shall be issued and signed by the president and secretary of said Board of Education, and the corporate seal of said Board shall be affixed thereto and the interest coupons shall bear fac-simile signatures of said President and Secretary, and shall be cut off when paid.

3. Said Bonds shall refer on their face to Chapter 46 of the Code of West Virginia, (1916 Ed.) under which they are issued, if the issue of said bonds shall be authorized by the special election hereinafter called by this order, and the said Board of Education shall cause said bonds to be prepared in proper form as hereinbefore provided in this order, as soon as practicable after said election, and said bonds are carried favorably by vote at said election, shall offer for sale and sell said bonds to the highest responsible bidder, to be approved by the said Board of Education, for cash, for a sum not less than one hundred dollars (\$100) each, and the proceeds arising from such sale of said bonds shall be used by the said Board of Education for the purposes hereinbefore stated and no other; but before any such sale of said bonds shall be made, notice thereof shall be published in some newspaper of general circulation in said City of Clarksburg, once in each week for at least four successive weeks before making such sale, and such additional notices may be given as said Board of Education may direct.

4. Said Board of Education shall, in and for the year of 1916, and each successive year thereafter until such bonded indebtedness is paid off and discharged, levy a district annual tax, as provided by law, upon all taxable property within the magisterial District of Coal outside of the Clarksburg Independent School District, which constitute the territorial limits of said School District, at the maximum rate of which tax to be levied shall not exceed seven (7) cents upon each one hundred dollars (\$100) of assessed valuation in the Clarksburg Independent School District of Coal, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonded indebtedness, and to provide a sinking fund for the purpose of paying the principal of said bonds, within the period of fifteen years from the said 1st day of August, 1916, said special levy shall be known as a "School Building Bonds of 1916" and funds collected from such levy shall be used for no other purpose than to pay said bonds, or pursuant to this order, until all questions connected with the same shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people of said School District of Coal, described as aforesaid at a special election called by said Board of Education, to be held for that purpose on the 6th day of June, 1916, at the same time and in the same places in said School District, that the District, County, and State-wide Primary Election is held, and all questions connected with said debt, money to be borrowed, and bonds to be sold, shall have received three-fourths of all the votes cast for and against the same, and until the question of such special levy hereinbefore mentioned and

described shall have been submitted to the voters of said School District at the same election, and received a majority of the votes cast at such election, which majority shall be in favor of said levy.

6. All provisions of the laws concerning general elections and the manner of conducting the same as far as they are applicable, except as follows: A separate ticket shall be used for each election, and on such ticket shall be printed a brief statement of the questions submitted to the qualified voters of said School District, in the following words, to-wit: "To authorize the Board of Education of Coal District, to borrow Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) and issue bonds therefor, in accordance with the order of said Board of Education, entered on the 20th day of May, 1916, for the purpose of building, completing, enlarging, repairing and furnishing school houses in said School District"; and directly underneath, in two separate lines, shall be printed the words, "For the Levy" and "Against the Bonds"; and the qualified electors of said District who may desire to vote to borrow said money, and issue said bonds shall erase the words "Against the Bonds", and those who may desire to vote against the borrowing of said money, and the issue of said bonds shall erase the words "For the Levy". And at the same election, there shall also be submitted to the qualified electors of said School District, the question of said special levy, to-wit: "Levy for School Building Bonds of 1916"; and at such election there shall be printed on the same ticket, in two separate lines, aforesaid, a brief statement of the question of said levy submitted in the following words, to-wit: "Special Levy to authorize a maximum special bond levy of seven (7) cents, according to the order of the Board of Education of Coal District, entered on the 20th day of May, 1916, for the purpose of paying the interest and to provide a sinking fund to discharge the bonds issued for the purpose of building, repairing and furnishing school houses in said District, in two separate lines shall be printed the words, "For the Levy" and "Against the Levy"; and those who may desire to vote for the levy, shall erase the words, "Against the Levy"; and those who may desire to vote against the levy, shall erase the words, "For the Levy".

7. Said Special Election shall be held on Tuesday, the 6th day of June, 1916, at the same time and in the same places in said District, that the District, County, and State-wide Primary Election is held, and between the hours of 8 o'clock A. M. and 8:30 o'clock P. M., on said day, and all legal registered voters residing in said School District of Coal, or in other words, all legal registered voters residing in the territorial limits of the Clarksburg Independent School District, shall be qualified to vote at said special election upon all questions relative to said bonds and said levy. EMORY H. BATES, President.

8. The President of this Board of Education shall furnish to each election officer hereinafter appointed at each voting place in said School District a sufficient number of tickets, as many as may be required, before prescribed, poll books, tally sheets, and all other things necessary for the conduct of the election, and the result of said election shall be certified to the Board of Education of said District, which shall, in turn, certify to the Board of Education of said District, which shall, in turn, declare the result of said election, and otherwise proceed in all respects according to law.

9. Said special election shall be held at the following voting places, which have been established and numbered by the County Clerk of Harrison County, West Virginia, as election precincts, and embraces all those election precincts, together with the number of the same so established in said Magisterial District of Coal, outside of the territorial limits of the Clarksburg Independent School District, and being all the voting places in said District, and being located within the territorial limits of said School District of Coal; and the following Commissioners and Clerks are hereby appointed as election officers to hold said election, at said voting places and election precincts, as follows, to-wit:

Precinct No. 1, Reynoldsville School House: Hugh J. Thompson, N. N. Proper, and B. L. Gathrop, Commissioners; John Thompson and F. H. Morris, Clerks.

Precinct No. 2, Wilsonburg School House: John T. Fildan, D. H. Strother and Ira Pittman, Commissioners; Dr. H. J. Brown and O. C. Hannah, Clerks.

Precinct No. 3, West End, Adamston: John B. Whitman, Earl McCarty and James B. Freeman, Commissioners; Harvey Williams and James C. Garrett, Clerks.

Precinct No. 4, Hepzibah School House: Ernest Cunningham, W. Dean and F. O. Reynolds, Commissioners; Quay Haller and Austin McIntyre, Clerks.
