

STATE TEAM WINS SECOND GAME FROM WESLEYAN NINE

Latterner Outpitches Thurmond in Game Played at Fairmont Monday.

FAIRMONT, June 6.—Before a large crowd here Monday West Virginia triumphed over Wesleyan in an exciting game in which the breaks very largely figured. West Virginia scored in the second on a single, an error and a wild pitch, twice in the third on three singles, a wild peg, a boot and a sacrifice and finished its run getting in the fourth on Flinn's triple and Miller's error, this being the only extra base hit of the game. 
