well has been completed and proves a failure is hope of the discovery of a new pool or an extension of an old field abandoned. There are times when one dry hole is not sufficient to discourage a further search in the same locality or direction. Operators have for some time been cognizant of the fact that one dry hole does not condemn any large acreage. The recently discovered new pools or extensions confirm the opinion and contradict former theories. After all the drill is the surest test for new producing territory.

On Big Sandy creek, Big Sandy district Kanawha county, the South Penn Oil Company drilled its test on the M. E. Deel farm through the Weir sand and gave it a shot. The ensuing twenty-four hours the well produced 15 barrels. The location is 1,200 feet southwest of the same company's test on the Levi Deel farm. In the Blue Creek field the same company shot its No. 5 on the Jesse James farm in the Squaw sand and increased its production from one to five barrels a day.

In the Weir sand development on Indian creek, Elk district, the United Fuel Gas Company completed and shot No. 7 on lease No. 3 on the W. H. and Mary J. Morris farm and it is showing for an eight-barrel pumper. On Laurel fork of Horse creek, Duval district, Lincoln county, the same company has started to drill No. 14 on the Horse Creek Land and Coal Company's tract.

Weir Sand Gasser.

In Big Sandy district, Kanawha county, the South Penn Oil Company drilled a test on the M. E. Morley farm through the sand and has a fair gasser in that formation. On Clover creek, Smithfield district, Roane county, the Carter Oil Company has drilled its test on the T. M. Perot farm through the Berea grit. A light show of oil was developed in the Big Injun sand and it was given two shots, one of twenty and the other of sixty quarts but it failed to respond and will be abandoned.

In Geary district, Roane county, the South Penn Oil Company's No. 5 on the A. B. Caldwell farm is a five-barrel pumper in the Big Injun sand. In Spencer district the company's test on the G. M. Sergeant farm is a gasser in the Berea grit.

Ritchie County Completions.

On Lynn Camp run, Clay district, Ritchie county, the Philadelphia Company drilled its test on the L. C. Wilson farm through all sands and is said to find oil or gas in paying quantities in any of the sands. The same company's tests on the H. J. Knight, John Jones and E. R. Taylor heirs' farms are all fair gassers in the Big Injun sand. The Carnegie Natural Gas Company has drilled a test on the E. L. Summers farm, located on Slab run, Union district, through all sands. Nothing was found in any of the formations and it will be abandoned.

One mile east of Beech Bottom, Buffalo district, Brooke county, Furman and Company drilled their test on the D. E. Heff farm through the Berea grit and scored a duster. In the Burning Springs district, Wirt county, the South Penn Oil Company's test on the S. A. Pettit farm is a gasser in the salt sand.

Southeastern Ohio.

In the deep sand territory, Falls Gore township, Hocking county, O., the Griffin Producing Company completed and shot a test on the Jacob Snider farm and it is showing for a twenty-barrel producer. They found thirty-five feet of Clinton sand in this well and the location is three-fourths of a mile in advance and southeast of production and promises to point the way to an extension. In the Bremen district, Rush Creek township, Fairfield county, the Carter Oil Company has completed a fifteen-barrel pumper at its test on the David Ruff farm.


Shallow Sand Wells.

In the Corning field, Monroe township, Perry county, John Denman and Son's No. 7 on the C. C. Stottler farm is a light pumper in the Berea grit. In the same district John Amberg completed No. 7 on his own farm and has a light pumper. E. J. Edmonds and Company's test on the N. Newberry farm is a duster in the Berea grit.

Southwest Pennsylvania.

Operators on Lowry's run, Ross township, Allegheny county, are meeting with disappointments. Stier and Company's test on the Wise farm is a failure in the 100-foot sand and will be drilled deeper. The Marshall and Company test on the Stier farm is also a failure in the same formation and will be drilled to the lower sands. At West View, McCleary and Company have a show for a very light well at their test on the Kopp farm. In Big Sewickley creek, Beaver county, E. A. Dream has a light pumper

WEST UNION, June 17. — West Union is planning to celebrate the Fourth of July in a manner probably never before attempted in a town of its size. Thousands of persons from all parts of northern West Virginia are expected to be here to attend the mammoth celebration. The big feature of the celebration will be an automobile hill climbing race, starting from the center of the town and ending at the top of Hannon's Knob, a precipitous hill overlooking West Union.

Other features of the celebration will be an automobile parade, business men's parade, suffrage parade, baby show, truck race, sack race, potato race, greased pole, merry-go-round, dancing, vaudeville shows, pit show and public speaking by prominent orators. There will be a great pyrotechnic display at night. Music will be furnished for the occasion by a brass band.


