### RECOUNT

Of Vote for Governor Reduces  
Robinson's Majority in the  
County Two Votes.

The recount of the Republican vote cast at the primary election for governor finished Tuesday by the county court, resulted in a reduction of Ira E. Robinson's majority by two votes. The recount gives him a majority of 252 votes in this county over A. A. Lilly, two less than the canvassed majority of 254. In the recount Robinson gained two votes and Lilly gained four. The totals as shown by the recount are:
