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

STANISLAU IS MOST IMPORTANT RAILROAD CITY OF GALICIA

The taking of Stanislaw was a signal victory for the Russians; it is of great strategic value, being the center of four railroad systems and containing terminal facilities, with railroad shops. The Russians will be able to use two of the railroad lines for transporting supplies and establishing communication along their front. The other lines lead to Przemyśl and Lemberg.

Before the war the city of Stanislaw was very beautiful, filled with the pretty homes of foreigners and quaint architectural expressions of the Austrian home builder. At the present time it is in the state of turmoil and desolation usually attendant upon a city being in a state of siege for some time, and showing the effects of shell fire.

"GREASY" NEALE TO COACH WESLEYAN FOOTBALL SQUAD

Definite Announcement Made by Stansbury; Will Report September 20.

**BUCKHANNON, Aug. 17.**—Earl Neale, outfielder for the Cincinnati Nationals and one of the best known athletes in the state of West Virginia, will be head football coach at Wesleyan College this year. Definite announcement to this effect was made this morning by Harry A. Stansbury, athletic director.

J. S. Kellison, another athletic star turned out by Wesleyan, will be assistant coach. Neale will also coach the basketball team and Kellison will remain throughout the year as gymnasium instructor and assistant in other branches of athletics than football.

Both Neale and Kellison are distinctly Wesleyan products and while the selection of these men does not by any means indicate that Wesleyan will definitely adopt a system of graduate coaching, it does indicate that of all the large number of applicants for the position of coaches here that these were considered the most available. Neale was secured only after long and tedious negotiations for his release from a contract which he had signed to coach at Muskingum College in Ohio, but since his phenomenal success with the Muskingum squad in 1915 it has been the set purpose of those in authority here to secure him if possible. Neale came to Wesleyan from Parkersburg high school where he had reigned supreme and terrorized all opponents by his skill at handling forward passes in football and his great all round game at basketball. Here he immediately made himself a local idol by contributing in a large measure to Wesleyan's winning her first state championship in football, baseball and basketball. After leaving here in the spring of 1914 he played with Toledo in the American Association at baseball and the following year with Wheeling in the Central League. From this club he was drafted by Cincinnati and has been making good in the "big show" with a vengeance. Kellison has for four years been all-state selection as tackle and his wide experience as well as the great prestige he has throughout the state should stand him in good stead in his duties here.

The bringing of Neale and Kellison into Wesleyan athletics places the entire authority in athletics here under graduate control, Stansbury having been re-elected graduate manager and athletic director last June. This trio played a most important part in the bringing of Wesleyan's first championships here in 1912 and it is singular that after a lapse of only four years they should be seen in the places of authority.

Neale and Kellison will have a tough row to hoe this fall since Wesleyan is scheduled to meet Washington and Jefferson, Georgetown, Pennsylvania State, Georgetown, Marietta, Westminster, West Virginia and other minor teams, and the schedule is generally regarded as the most difficult that any Orange and Black team has ever had to play.

The time for Neale's reporting has not been definitely decided but it is expected that he will be able to get away by September 20 at the latest as it is apparent even at this date that Cincinnati is not a factor in the league's race for the pennant.

Neale was a student at Wesleyan during the three years, 1912 to 1914, inclusive, but did not secure his degree on account of dropping out to coach and play baseball. He was captain of the baseball team in 1914 and of the basketball team the same year, but was never at the head of the football team, being elected in 1914 but failing to return to college.

Kellison had a long career at Wesleyan, being permitted to play more than his allotted four years and being captain of the eleven in 1913. He received his bachelor's degree from Wesleyan in 1916. During his college career Kellison took an active part in all forms of athletics and not exactly in football as many suppose.

Stansbury, also, has been at Wesleyan for many years and was captain of the football team in 1912, the first team, by the way, that won a state championship. He received his bachelor's degree in 1915, and was elected athletic director at the same time. He also took part in

baseball as a pitcher, and was captain of the team in 1913.

The entire trio during their college careers were consistently selected on all-West Virginia teams in every branch of athletics, and it would be difficult to pick three men who have gone out from Wesleyan who have been more prominent in their success.

is to conduct hearings to develop facts as to the status in America of the farm tenant, the farm laborer and the immigrant in his relation to the land. The conference leaders expect the hearing to put the delegates in a position to sound the dominant chord in the formation of a comprehensive land policy for the United States. How to handle the immigrant and how to move landless men to the land will be stressed. Economists, government officials and leaders in industries dependent on farming will co-operate.

The national conference on marketing and farm credits is an open forum in the fourth year of its existence. All of its meetings have been held in Chicago. In 1915 delegations came from forty-six states and from several provinces in Canada. Its general committee signing the call are: Chairman Frank L. McVey, Grand Forks, N.
