## West Virginia Briefs

**WHEELING:** Many improvements have been made at the fair grounds for the big fair, which will be held here September 4 to 8, inclusive. The fair association has taken in the grounds of the ball park, giving an additional space of eight acres to the fair grounds this year, and additional buildings have been erected for horses, cattle, etc.

**CHARLESTON:** Employees in the various shops of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company have appointed delegates to ask officials of the road to allow them a semi-monthly pay. Delegates have also been appointed to call on the state commissioner of labor, J. H. Nightingale, to ask his assistance in bringing about two pay days every month.

**ROMNEY:** An organization of women in Hampshire county has been effected to carry on equal suffrage work. Miss Meeda Wirgman has been elected chairman. Literary Hall, in this city, has been made headquarters, which will be kept open. The women will work in conjunction with the state suffrage headquarters in Morgantown and direct their labors largely toward efforts to influence the male voters to vote for the suffrage amendment, to be printed on the ballots in November.

**WEIRTON:** Officers of the Grand Lodge of Knights of Pythias of West Virginia officiated at the cornerstone of the new \$50,000 school building here. Samuel B. Montgomery, of Kinwood, grand keeper of records and seal, delivered the principal address.

**CHARLESTON:** Earl Mullens, aged 23, was shot and instantly killed by a

gun in the hands of his brother, Albert, two years his senior, at the Mullens home on Davis Creek. The boys did not know the gun was loaded.

**PARKERSBURG:** Following a quarrel with a son who threatened to leave home, Mrs. Monnon Craig, aged 60, committed suicide by taking strychnine. Her body was found in a woods not far from the home.

**MARTINSBURG:** The Rev. Dr. W. C. Taylor, pastor of the First Baptist church at Clarksburg, has accepted a call tendered him to become pastor of the First Baptist church in this city. He will assume his duties September 3.

**HUNTINGTON:** Captain J. E. McDonald, in command of the Huntington district recruiting department of the United States army the last three years, has been ordered to join the Twenty-third Infantry of the army stationed at El Paso, Tex., September 2. His successor has not yet been named. The Huntington district embraces recruiting stations in West Virginia, a part of southern Ohio and eastern Kentucky.

**MOUNDSVILLE:** The entire countryside was called out to rescue Mrs. W. H. Downey, of Broad Tree, a woman weighing 240 pounds, who became mentally deranged and jumped into a well forty feet deep and containing four feet of water. Finally she was rescued with ropes as she was trying to drown herself in the water.

**WHEELING:** Denouncing further delay in obtaining a pure water supply for Wheeling as "almost criminal," Dr. S. L. Jepson, state health commissioner, has written to Mayor H. L. Kirk urging the installation immediately of a chlorinating purifying system at the Wheeling water works. Dr. Jepson fears a typhoid fever outbreak in the city.

**CHARLESTON:** Leaving only 11 Company on duty in the flood district of Cabin creek, all the troops of the Second West Virginia Infantry have been called into mobilization camp. Scores of enlisted men were detained by the police here late last night, when an order was telephoned from mobilization camp to arrest all men in uniform. An effort was being made to capture Private John Hill, who had escaped from the guard house.

The report, however, is not satisfactory in other respects than the question of truth telling. It shows that crime among the young has increased as high as thirteen per cent in certain fields among young boys and girls. There was a rise of nine per cent in the number of juvenile burglars; three per cent in hold-up men and thirteen per cent in moral offenses against women. There was also an increase of eleven per cent in truancy and the number of vagrants was three per cent larger.

An indication that home life is losing its interest is seen in the fact that nine per cent more boys and twelve per cent more girls ran away. "The enticing loop cabaret," is blamed by Dr. Healey for part of the increase.



## DELINQUENCY

Of Girls Caused by Physical Development, Says an Expert.

CHICAGO, Aug. 19.—A deduction of at least fifty per cent in lying and discovery that overdevelopment in physical characteristics is one of the chief reasons for the moral delinquency of young girls, are two interesting features of a report on a psychopathical research into the youth brought before the Chicago juvenile court. The report has just been compiled by Dr. William F. Healey, director of the Psychopathic Institute of the juvenile court, and his assistant, Augusta F. Bronner.
