**POLITICAL GOSSIP AT NATIONAL SEAT**

(SPECIAL TO THE TELEGRAM)  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—It is now announced that Pershing's punitive expedition troops will not be entirely withdrawn from Mexico until the arbitration commission recommends evacuation. The American representatives on the commission, except Secretary Lane, have not yet been appointed. A policy of delay has characterized the latest chapter in the Mexican mixup for a reason that is so obviously dictated by political expediency that it isn't questioned. How near the border line Pershing's troops are now isn't known here outside the war department. That they have been gradually withdrawn is not doubted. General Funston's telegram advising complete withdrawal has been the most embarrassing thing that has happened to the politicians of the administration, from Woodrow Wilson down, which has happened recently in connection with the mismanagement of Mexican affairs. That was the main question the arbitrators were to consider. The administration is now trying to find out who let this Funston advisory telegram to the war department loose into the white gleams of "pitiless publicity." On top of the Mexican problem comes one out of Panama where revolutions are impending as a result of the recent elections there. Both sides to the Panama trouble blame the Wilson administration for it. They both asked this government to supervise the election as it has done in San Domingo and Haiti several times. But President Wilson refused on the ground that we should not mix in the internal affairs of another country. This was not the policy pursued as to Mexico, San Domingo and Haiti. Just a direct opposite to it. Officials acquainted with Panama conditions expect trouble there soon of such seriousness as will compel the administration to send troops to the Isthmus to take charge and restore law and order.

In the Congressional Record of the 18th Inst. is printed a speech by Congressman Cooper on the flood disaster in West Virginia and the resolution offered for the relief of the sufferers therefrom. In the Monday issue of the Record there is another speech by Mr. Cooper on the increase of the navy and the appropriations bill which provided for it. Both are excellent reading, and further go to show the active interest which Mr. Cooper takes in his congressional work, a fact which has been frequently commented upon in this correspondence until now it is a well known fact to the people of West Virginia that there is no better representative from their state than the able and industrious Mercer county congressman.

In concluding his remarks on the flood sufferers of West Virginia, Mr. Cooper said: "Let us hope that the spirit shown here today—a spirit of co-operation and aid, a disposition shown by the House of Representatives to send sympathy in substantial form to those needing aid in time of distress—will revive the spirit of hope in the hearts of the afflicted people and impress the nation with the fact that while the national government expects every man in time of danger to the republic to respond to the call of his country, with his life if necessary, still in time of distress the government will respond in the same spirit to aid and assist its citizens when some great calamity befalls them."

In his speech on naval preparedness, he spoke in favor of it in the present uncertain conditions of international affairs, but chided the majority party for changing its mind and having to come over and adopt military preparedness which was forced upon them by Republican agitation. He recounted some "switches," president's well known "switches," and characterized the Wilson policies as one thing today and another entirely different thing tomorrow. He also took occasion to call attention to the public money over and above the increased appropriations entailed by the effort to adequately prepare the country in a naval and military way for any eventualities of the future.



**PLAGUE CONFERENCES IN MONTH OF OCTOBER**

Are Announced to Be Held in Cities in Various Sections of United States.

(SPECIAL TO THE TELEGRAM)  
NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—Sectional conferences on tuberculosis will be held during the month of October in New Haven, Conn., Louisville, Ky., Jackson, Miss., Newark, N. J., and Albuquerque, N. M., under the auspices of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, according to a bulletin issued today.

The Louisville conference, which will comprise the Mississippi valley territory of each of these conferences will appoint delegates, and the mayors of practically all of the principal cities will send representatives. Chambers of commerce, state and county medical societies, anti-tuberculosis associations, women's clubs and other civic and social groups are being urged to send delegates to the conference in their various districts. The programs of each conference will be suited to the locality in which the conference is held. Speakers of national prominence will be present at these meetings.

The states comprised in the New England conference are Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut. The North Atlantic conference states are New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia and the District of Columbia. The southern conference states are North and South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana.
