GOOD RECIPES

AMERICA'S UP-TO-DATE METHOD OF MAKING COFFEE.

Use a modern percolating coffee pot. Measure a heaping teaspoonful of medium ground Chicago Dairy coffee for each cup of cold water. 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

SPECIAL TERMS

Of the United States Court Are to Be Held in September.

The first term of the United States court since the June term will be a special one to be held at Philippi September 5, for the trial of a civil case now pending on the docket there.

A special term will be held at Martinsburg, starting September 12, for the purpose of trying Jeff Harrison and Eugene Diez, who are charged with holding up a train at Central. Diez was arrested last July in Colorado and taken through here to Martinsburg, where he now is in jail awaiting trial. Harrison is in jail under special guard. Both prisoners have been indicted. Dick Harrison, who is in custody in Wheeling, is being held as a witness in the case. The crime being one of the most sensational ever committed in this section, the trial will be followed with interest by the public. The regular term of the federal court will begin at Martinsburg on September 19. As a large number of criminal cases are to come before the grand jury, the fall term promises to be a long and busy one.
