Ice Without Refrigerator.
Make two bags out of an old woolen blanket, one three inches larger than the other. Place the smaller bag inside the larger and fill the space between the two bags with the feathers. Sew the top edges of the two bags together, then place the ice in the smaller bag and fasten them tight. Put bags in box with an opening in it so that the water may drain off. This is a simple homemade device, but the ice will keep for days.


