**PUBLIC STREET**

Strip of Land in the Town of Broad Oaks is Adjudged to Be by Court.

Judge Jake Fisher, of Sutton, sitting on the local circuit court bench Saturday, decided the case of the Town of Broad Oaks and others against the Broad Oaks Development Company and others, recently submitted to him, adjudged that a strip of land thirty feet wide between Daisy and Harrison streets and in line with North street is a public street of that town, the decree being entered without prejudice to the rights of the defendants to institute suit for compensation for the strip of land.

**BABY DEAD**

And Its Mother is Perhaps Fatally Burned as Results of an Explosion.

**MORGANTOWN, Sept. 30.**—Mrs. Andrew Doka, aged 20, a Hungarian woman living at Sabraton, near here, was perhaps fatally burned and her eight-month-old baby girl is dead as the result of the mother pouring kerosene oil on the fire this morning. The oil can exploded throwing oil throughout the room, causing the contents of the room and the woman's clothing to instantly burst into flames. Screaming with pain the distracted mother grabbed her baby from the cradle nearby and rushed into the yard. No one else was in the house at the time of the explosion. Neighbors attracted by her screams beat out the flames but not until the clothing and hands and legs of the infant badly burned. The baby's eyes were destroyed and she died at the hospital a few hours later. There is little hope that Mrs. Doka will live. She would have become a mother in about two weeks, and it is understood a Caesarian operation will be performed this afternoon.

**MOBILIZATION DECREED**

**PATRIS, Greece, Sept. 28, via London, Sept. 30.**—The evening newspapers of Patris today publish a report that a general mobilization had been decreed. Reservists rushed to arms presenting themselves at the barracks to be equipped for a campaign. The greatest enthusiasm prevailed.


**WEBB HERE.**

**STATE SITES TO BE INSPECTED FOR FACTORIES**

Is the Assurance Given Congressman Sutherland by the Naval Board.

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.**—Congressman Sutherland had a conference Friday with officials of the naval board who are to pass on the eligibility of sites for the \$11,000,000 munition factory. This, in fact, was one of the main reasons for Mr. Sutherland's trip at this time, in order to talk with officials personally, supplementing what he had previously done to secure the location of the plant in West Virginia. The competition for the location of the plant is very keen, and officials are giving out little or no information concerning the matter. However, Mr. Sutherland was practically given the assurance that at least two of the sites in West Virginia were being considered in the eligible class and it was practically certain that they would receive a visit of inspection from the board of engineers and others, with whom rests the final decision. Congressman Sutherland will return to Washington on October 9 for a conference with Secretary Daniels on the subject, when the latter returns from his present speaking tour, and will remain for the final hearings of the different cities which will be held before the board on October 10. At that time it is expected that final arguments will be made by all cities that are endeavoring to secure the location of the plant, also any additional data not submitted at the time of the city's first hearing may be filed to receive proper consideration. The fight to secure the location of the plant in West Virginia either in Huntington or Moundsville, or any city in fact in the Ohio valley, is a very important thing and should receive the undivided support of every business man of the state. It is a fight for the location of a plant employing 10,000 well paid workers bringing all the benefits into the state that come with an increase of 10,000 population. But it will require united effort on the part of any locality to secure it rather than political pull. Congressmen can only present the cause of their constituents, it remaining for the city or locality desiring it to work with unity and courage for success and put forth a supreme effort to secure the favorable verdict of the navy department. It is understood that West Virginia has a remarkably strong case for the navy officials.

**INTEREST PAID**

By the Local Water Works and Sewerage Board on the Bonds of 1909.

Quite a nice sum of money was involved in a transaction today when the local water works and sewerage board made a cash payment of interest on the water works and sewerage bond issue of 1909, amounting to \$10,710. The total interest and sinking fund paid on this issue of 1909 by the water works and sewerage board to date amounts to \$122,510. It will be recalled that the water department not only discharges the interest and sinking fund on the bond issue of 1909, but is also paying off the issue for the original construction of the water works in 1888. These payments are anticipated by the department and have always been met promptly.
