NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—There was a man who bowed to me in a restaurant. And then he came to my table. Somewhere I had met him and somewhere he had met me. We talked of the weather, the Giants winning streak but avoided personal questions for he could not remember my name and I could not remember his. When we parted we shook hands and hoped we would meet again. A half hour later I remembered his name—and also remembered that he was a strolling player and came to a Missouri town where I was living. That night at the theater I saw him again the leading man in a Broadway production. I waited for him at the stage door. In an invalid's chair was a young woman also waiting. When he came out he was all concerned for her and for her comfort. He introduced me and I walked with him to his hotel while he wheeled his wife. Later in the lobby he told me the story. She too had been with him with the repertoire company. They had married six years ago and then a railroad wreck ended her stage career—an injury to the spine. Every night she waits for him. TRACK MILEAGE OF SYSTEM LARGE

Comptroller Shows Baltimore and Ohio System is 255.2 Miles Larger.

(SPECIAL TO THE TELEGRAM) BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 2.—The comptroller of the Baltimore and Ohio system has just issued a report showing the official mileage of tracks owned, jointly owned, leased and over which the railroad has trackage rights, as of June 30, 1916. The statement shows a total for all track operated, of 9,941.52 miles, being an increase of 255.2 miles over 1915. The Baltimore and Ohio now operates a total of 6,937.04 miles of main track, 5,899.33 miles of which it owns. Included in the main track mileage operated are 4,539.38 miles of first track, 1,295.24 of second track, 166.12 of third track and 36.30 of fourth track. In addition to the main tracks, the company operates a total of 3,004.48 miles of side and yard tracks, of which number it owns 2,957.38. The total of all tracks jointly owned is 123.66, the road operating but 4.41 miles under lease and having trackage rights over 146.71 miles. The mileage of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad proper for all tracks operated is 4,696.26, its largest subsidiary—the Baltimore and Ohio Southwestern Railroad Company—having a total track mileage of 1,470.29. The tracks of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company in Pennsylvania, another subsidiary line, number 717.55 miles, while the subsidiary Baltimore and Ohio and Chicago Railroad Company has a total of 767.11 track miles.


