
JAPANESE ACTRESS APPEARS AT GRAND



LEAGUE TO ENFORCE PEACE IS CHARTERED

Organization is Authorized by Law to Send Delegations to Conferences Abroad.

(SPECIAL TO THE TELEGRAM) NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—A statement from the headquarters of the League to Enforce Peace, of which ex-President Taft is head, announcing the incorporation of the league under the laws of the state of New Jersey, has just been given to the press. One of the features of the charter, or certificate of incorporation, is an authorization to the league's officers, to send delegates to unofficial conferences in foreign countries, such as were suggested recently by Lord Bryce.

President John Grier Hibben, of Hibben University; Harold J. Howland, of Montclair, N. J.; and Mr. Taft are named as trustees.

Some of the purposes of the league as outlined in the articles of incorporation are:

To spread knowledge. To spread throughout the United States knowledge, comprehension and understanding of the league's program which was adopted in Independence Hall, June 1915. This program provides for the formation of a league of the great powers, who shall agree to an enforced submission of all international disputes to an international court or council or conciliation, with a view to avoiding war in the future.

To circulate printed matter advocating the adoption of the league's proposals.

To hold conferences, congresses and other suitable assemblages. To maintain sub-division of the league of the various states.

To send conferences, delegates and delegations to confer with private persons and private organizations, (if and when the same shall come to be formed) in foreign countries for the purpose of explaining, inculcating and advocating the said principles; only and to attend any official meetings, assemblies or congresses which may be held in foreign countries for such purposes only.

To maintain district offices throughout the United States. To circulate reports of the proceedings of the league and its branches. To enlist the co-operation of all patriotic societies interested in world progress.

To advocate and seek by all proper and honorable means to obtain the approval and adoption by the people of the United States of the principles of the league as a settled national policy, and to secure such authoritative acquiescence therein by the people at large as will render possible the putting thereof into effective operation by the nations.
