OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

Creamed Carrots.
Four cupsful of carrots, scraped and cut; two tablespoons butter or bacon fat; two tablespoons grated onion; two tablespoons flour; one cup cold milk; two teaspoons salt; one-eighth teaspoon pepper; two tablespoons finely chopped parsley.
Put carrots in saucepan, cover with boiling water and boil forty-five minutes, or till tender; water should be nearly all boiled away. Cover with sauce, mix well and sprinkle with parsley.
Sauce—Put fat in pan, add onion, cook a few moments; add flour, stir till smooth; add milk, stirring constantly; add salt, pepper and half the parsley.

GREAT TARIFF SPEECH MADE BY WILLIAMS

Tipplate Official Convinces a Great Crowd at Weirton with His Forceful Logic.

The greatest political rally in the history of Weirton was held there by Republicans Wednesday evening, according to Chief of Police Harry L. Brooks, who returned Thursday morning to his home here after a short business trip to the Ohio valley city. Over 1,000 persons attended the meeting, which was addressed by Congressman Merrill, of Maine, and John C. Williams, assistant to the president of the Phillips Sheet and Tin Plate Company, the principal manufacturing plant of the city.

The speaking was preceded by a monster red fire parade, the chief said, with sixty automobiles, all owned by employes of the tin mills, in line.

Although Congressman Merrill was the principal speaker on the program, Mr. Williams' address on the tariff question was pronounced one of the best arguments in favor of a protective tariff ever heard in Weirton. Mr. Williams told his audience how, under a Democratic low tariff, the product of Europe's cheap labor, could be exported to this country and sold for less than the American manufacturer could sell it. The effects of such competition were pointed out by Mr. Williams, who said that American manufacturers would be forced to close their factories and the employes consequently thrown out of employment.

ENTHUSIASM


Is Lacking at Salem When John W. Davis, of This City, Talks about Prosperity.
