West Virginia Briefs

FAIRMONT: Barbers of the city planned to raise the price of a haircut from twenty-five to thirty-five cents, but somebody flaked and the scheme fell through with.

CHARLESTON: Revenue officers have arrived in Charleston from Raven's Eye, Fayette county, where they arrested Henry Reynolds, coal miner, on the charge of illicit distilling. Reynolds had a furnace in his home and a large quantity of mash. A kettle and a still were found in a shock of fodder nearby.

BECKLEY: Four minutes after the jury retired at the close of a second trial of Flynn Worley, for the murder of James Griffith, former deputy sheriff of this county, the twelve men had agreed upon a verdict of first degree murder. The mercy of the court was recommended and Worley was sentenced to life imprisonment.

CHARLESTON: Authority was given by the board of regents this week to President Frank B. Trotter of the West Virginia University to make an application at once to the adjutant general of the United States for permission to establish a unit of

infantry at the university. The institution has 530 cadets and qualifies under the federal rules to have a reserve officers' corps.

FAIRMONT: At a mass meeting of leading citizens of Fairmont in the city hall, Mayor Anthony Bowed presiding, it was decided to let the special bond issue election for Tuesday improvements go to a vote on Tuesday as planned. Fears had been entertained that estimates submitted last summer for the improvements would not hold good at present in view of recent advances in the cost of material and labor. The amount of the proposed bond issue is \$760,000. Of this amount \$350,000 is to be used for the construction of a new bridge across the Monongahela river, \$100,000 for a bridge across coal run, and the remainder for street improvements, sewers, the re-flooring of other city bridges, the refunding of outstanding bonds and the payment of all floating indebtedness.

CHARLESTON: John S. Horan, state fire marshal, has received a message from Sutton that indictments were returned by the grand jury of Braxton county, charging Jerry White, as the principal, and

CHARLESTON: With Examiner Edward F. Diehl, of Wheeling, in charge and making a detailed examination into its affairs, it is announced by Banking Commissioner S. P. Smith that the Union Bank and Trust Company at Bluefield, closed the forepart of the week, would probably be permitted to reopen after an adjustment was made in accordance with the plans of the department.

MIDDLEBOURNE: While grading for the Fairmont and Wyatt railroad on the B. W. Shinn farm near Pine Bluff, workmen unearthed a skeleton of a prehistoric human giant. The skull is the size of a two gallon bucket, the thigh bone four and one-half feet long, the ribs three times the size of a normal man and the other bones proportionately large. It is to be sent to a New York museum.

PARKERSBURG: Edgar Pahl, county clerk, has compiled the cost of the recent general election in Wood county and it totals \$12,000. This is twice as much as it cost other counties having double the number of precincts. On this basis the election cost the state nearly \$200,000.

MARTINSBURG: The Hagerstown and Frederick Railway Company, which some time ago acquired the Martinsburg Light and Power Company, has instructed its engineers to prepare plans for reconstructing and

improving Dams No. 4 and 5 in the Potomac river here.

BETHANY: Announcement is made that the new gymnasium being built at Bethany College will be completed and ready for occupancy January 1. The building, costing \$40,000, is a gift of the Irvin family, of Big Run, Pa.

WELLSBURG: H. C. Wells, of Beech Bottom, has disposed of his Beech Bottom lowlands to the Whitaker-Glessner Company, of Wheeling. The tract contained forty acres and the price paid for it was \$40,000.

CHARLESTON: The state department of schools has completed its work of classifying the high schools of west Virginia which will receive state aid. They are in three classes. Those classed as first number eighty-eight, an increase of twelve over last year. There are twenty-nine second class and thirty-four third class schools. Fourteen new schools were admitted during the last fiscal year to the third class. High schools of the first class will each receive \$865 from state aid; of the second class \$475, and third class \$275 each. Only the counties of Calhoun and Putnam have no high schools. Harrison county leads with six first class, four second class and one third class. Marion and Preston are tied for second place with eight high schools each.

FAIRMONT: The Fairmont Chamber of Commerce has promised co-operation to the Pittsburg chamber in a request made by it of the local body to investigate and report any willful des-

truction of produce in the city for the purpose of bringing about a forced advance in price.

CHARLESTON: Roy McLaughlin, of Nicholas county, has been found guilty of moonshining. Sentence will be pronounced later. Harry Parker is now on trial in United States district court following an indictment charging him with a violation of the Mann white slave act. Hattie May Taylor, 16 years old of Ironton, O., is the complaining witness.
